> George Albert Race, former postmanter of Houston under the Harrison administration, died early last night after a brief lliness, at his home, 928 South Alamo street. Heart disease was the cause of death. The body w to-day be taken to Mr. Races


> home in Illinois. Decedent had been a resident of San Antonio for the last three and one-half years, coming here from Houston. He was the owner of considerable realty. which includes a one-third interest in the St. James Hotel on East Houston

Mr. Race was born at Oswego, III., June 19, 1835. He was a veteran of the Civil War, entering the service in the Tenth Illinois Infantry, April 15, 1861, and was made a first sergeant Aug. 17 %f the same year. On March 2, 1862, he was appointed captain of Company F of that regiment, receiving his majority Dec. 2, 1864. He was honorably mustered out July 4, 1865. His war service was with the Army of the Cumberland. He was a member of the Loyal Legion and affiliated with the commandery of the State of Illinois.

Mr. Race was never married.
