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There is no real necessity for the waste of milk that goes on in many households where a larger supply is so frequently needed that too much is ordered regularly; or in the country, where the milk of one cow is an excess for the family and yet not sufficient to sell.

The uses of milk are manifold, and saving means only a little matter of looking into the variety of ways in which it may be used.

Eggs poached in milk are more delicate for the family and more nourishing for the invalid, says an expert nurse. Breakfast rolls dipped in milk before reheating in the oven are made much more crisp and desirable. A very dry loaf of bread soaked in milk and then rebaked will be so rejuvenated as to become almost a freshly baked loaf.

For the despicible member of the family bread on which fast-boiling milk is poured will not be an indigestible supper. Indian meal should be boiled with milk as a healthy supper for little children, and eaten with cream as a fat-producing diet for too thin children.

Rice and farina boiled in milk are more nourishing than the carefully thrown together cereals cooked in water. In boiling Indian meal for fried mush milk or half milk as moistener will facilitate the frying and produce a rich brown color and a delightful crispness.

Morning's milk yields more cream than evening's, and that taken at noon yields least of all.—New York Press.

RECIPES. French Creamed Dates.—One scant cupful of creamed sugar, 1/2 cupful of water, white of 1 egg, mixed with water, add flavoring. Boil all together, allow it to cool, then work between the hands and cut in pieces large enough to fill dates from which the stones have been removed. Roll dates in granulated sugar.

Dainty Molasses Wafers.—A scant quart of flour before it is sifted, 2.3 cup of lard rubbed into the flour. Then make a hole in the flour and put in 1 cup of molasses, 12 teaspoon of salt, 1/2 teaspoon of ginger and 1 teaspoon of soda wet in two teaspoons of cold water, then mix. Take small pieces of the dough and roll very thin, cut out and bake.

Tomato Soup.—Boil chicken or beef four hours, then strain; add to the soup 1 can of tomatoes and boil one hour. Salt and pepper to taste. This will make four quarts of soup.

Crabs and Mushrooms.—Melt two tablespoonsful of butter, then add two tablespoonsful of flour, and cook well. Add one cup of heated cream, and cook until thick, stirring constantly. Season to taste; add one cup of crab meat and one cup of chopped fresh mushrooms fried in butter. Simmer for ten minutes. Take from the fire and add the yolks of two eggs beaten light with two tablespoonsful of sherry. Serve with hot buttered toast.

Blisque of Oysters.—Let two quarts of milk come to a boil. Take two plates of oysters, drain off the liquid, put in a chopping bowl and chop fine. Stir two small tablespoonsful of flour in four of melted butter. Put the oysters in the boiling milk, stir in the butter and flour, season with pepper and salt, let boil up once and serve.

Fried Bananas.—Peel ripe bananas, cut in half, roll in eggs beaten with cold water or milk, then in flour, and fry in deep hot fat until a golden yellow. If you wish to serve them for dessert sprinkle with sugar and lemon juice; if as a vegetable, sprinkle lightly with salt.
