Downers Grove, Ill., May 6, 1912.

The adjourned regular meeting from April 19th, 1912, was called to order by Clerk White. Roll call noted present Trustees Barr, Cook, Dicke, Handy, Haller and Herring; absent none.

The resignation of G. H. Bunge as village attorney was read. It was moved by Trustees Herring and Handy that resignation be accepted. Carried.

Mr. John Gustus being present spoke to the board about the Library Board and read an opinion from his attorney on the legality of the tax levy including a sum for building purposes, etc. President Ellis stated that if papers were left with the board matter would be investigated.

It was moved by Trustees Herring and Handy that the board adjourn sine die. Motion carried.

The new board was called to order by Clerk White. Roll call noted present Trustees Barr, Handy, Haller, Herring, Mahoney and Littleford. An ordinance was read designating the member of the board of local improvements for the ensuing year, namely President Ellis and Trustees Herring, Barr and Handy. It was moved by Trustees Barr and Herring ordinance be put upon its passage. Motion carried. Said ordinance was then passed. Those voting aye were: Trustees Barr, Handy, Haller, Herring, Mahoney and Littleford. President Ellis then offered the following committee appointments for the ensuing year:

Finance—Haller, Mahoney and Littleford.

Water and Light—Herring, Haller and Mahoney.

Street and Alley—Handy, Littleford and Barr.

Sewers—Littleford, Handy and Haller.

License—Barr, Handy and Mahoney.

Printing—Mahoney, Littleford and Herring.

Ordinance—Barr, Herring and Haller.

Applications for beer peddler's license were read from the P. Schoenhofen Brewery Co., also Peter Hand Brewery Co., and upon motion of Trustees Barr and Handy were referred to the license committee.

Applications were read from Jay G. Butler and F. R. Morris requesting druggists' permits for the ensuing year. It was moved by Trustees Mahoney and Haller permits be granted upon filing of proper bonds. Motion carried, all voting aye except Trustees Herring and Littleford, who voted nay.

Trustee Barr of the license committee reported for the license committee as favorable on granting license to the P. Schoenhofen Brewery Co. and Peter Hand Brewery Co. President Ellis ordered licenses issued.

Question of wheel tax was discussed. It was moved by Trustees Barr and Littleford matter be referred to the ordinance committee to prepare an ordinance repealing the wheel tax ordinance. Motion carried.

Upon proper motion board adjourned.
