GREEN SWALE YIELDS FISH.

Fish for breakfast, dinner and supper was to be had for a little exertion at the Green Swale on the Frank E. Herrick farm, south of Wheaton, the latter part of last week. The swale is being drained into a drainage well, leaving the fish high and dry.

Neighbors came with baskets, milk cans and tubs, when the word was sent out that fish were to be had for the asking. Allie Weisbrook was one of the most fortunate, filling a basket full of the fish-German carp. The fish range from a foot to two feet in length. They are slow and sluggish of movement and easily captured.

Magistrate Herrick says the affair is an annual occurrence and not worth much as news. Still there are more fish which will die in a few days if not taken away. Crows and other bird scavengers are helping themselves to the dead.-DuPage County Tribune.
