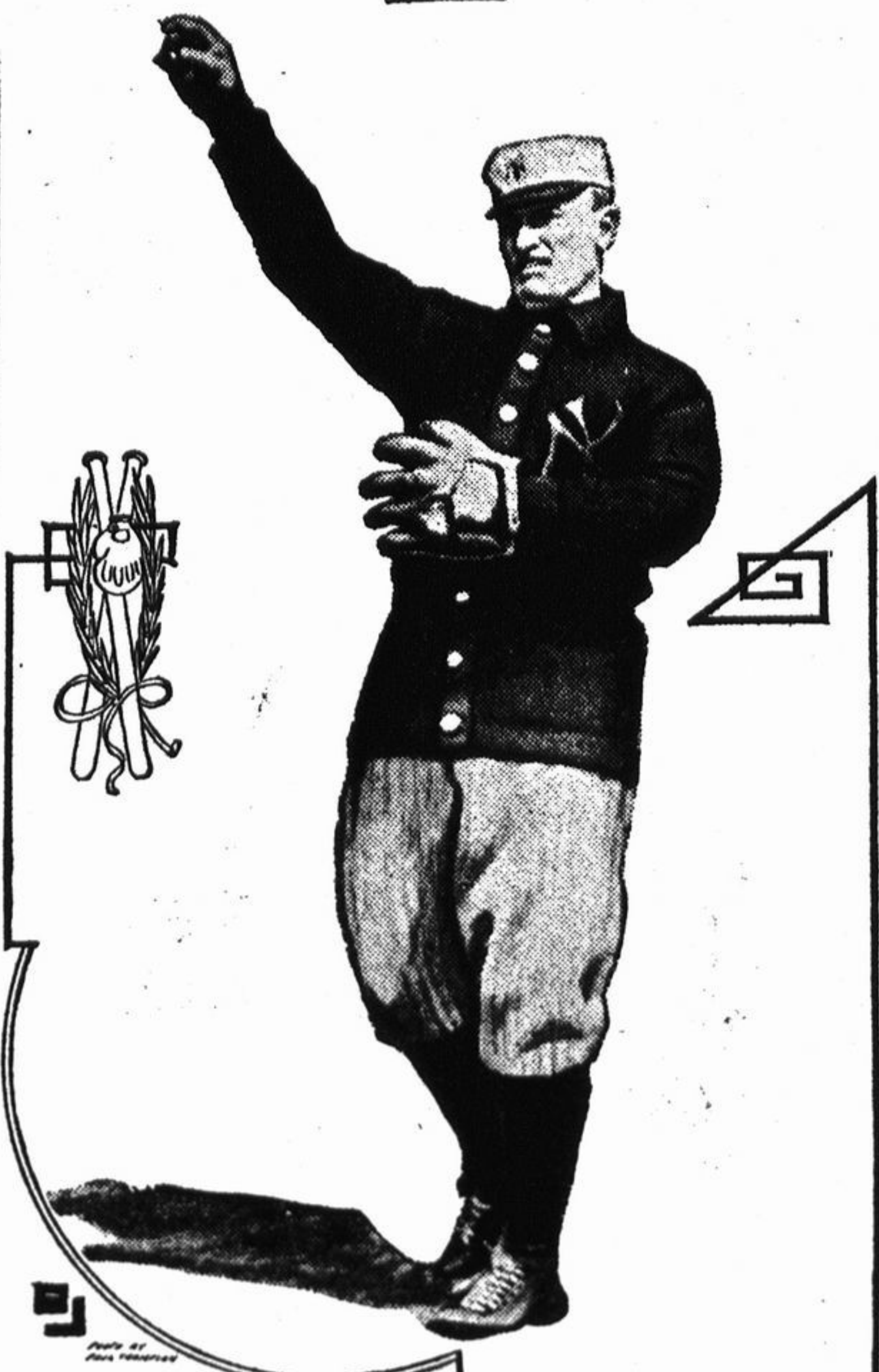
HEIRESS STRIVES TO AID POOR.
