Officials of the Illinois State Association for the Frevention of Tuberculosis are encouraged over the reports received from different sections of the state on the sales of Red Cross Christmas seals. That the sales will be considerably larger than they were a year ago seems assured, but that Illinois will still be far behind some other states in the war on tuberculosis is equally certain.

One of the most gratifying features of the campaign is the news that the board of supervisors of Kane county has voted an appropriation of \$5,000 to purchase four acres of land and a house for a tuberculosis sanitarium. The site is centrally located and easily accessible to all parts of the county, and while no appropriation has yet been made for maintenance, the purchase of the site marks a forward step for this state.

The action of the Kane county supervisors is in accord with the law of 1909 which gives county boards authority to provide for tuberculosis sanitariums. So far Kane county is the first to avail itself of this authority and it is to be hoped that others will follow the example.

In New York state, twenty-five counties have taken steps to provide hospital care and treatment for the tubercular sick and it is believed that by the end of the year 1915 every county in the state of New York will have provided for its consumptives.

Illinois has been backward in taking steps for the proper care and treatment of its consumptives. Too much stress has been laid on a state sanitarium. Not only would such a sanitarium be utterly inadequate to meet the demands, but it would be impossible to locate it so that it would be convenient of access to every portion of the state.

The Illinois law should be amended so as to allow of two or more adjoining counties joining together in the erection of tuberculosis sanitariums where it might be difficult for one county to raise the necessary funds. Ohio has successfully adopted this plan. Other states are awakening to the importance of conserving the health of the people and Illinois should not lag behind in this regard.

Education and agitation are needed to arouse the people on this subject. The Red Cross Seal offers a simple and practical method of raising funds for educational work. The little Christmas seal is in itself a great educational force. Since the Red Cross seals were placed on the market this season, the Chicago Tuberculosis Institute has received dozens of quiries regarding the best place send consumptives, or the proper steps to take to guard against the spread of the disease. In some instances visiting nurses have been sent to homes of sufferers and in other instances patients have been re-\$58,935.78 moved to institutions where they will receive proper treatment.

Most of the inquiries come from persons whose attention has been directed to the Institute by means of the Red Cross Christmas seals. They have noticed the little stickers offered 498.16 for sale and made inquiries regarding the work.

Thousands of consumptives were relieved last year by the funds raised through the sales of Red Cross seals. Hospitals, day camps, dispensaries and open-air schools were provided. Every cent derived from the sale of the seals, after deducting the actual cost of printing, is used in the immediate locality in which the seals are sold. No commissions are paid to agents, the hundreds of workers throughout the state giving their services voluntarily to aid the cause.

The Red Cross seals carry a New Year's greeting as well as a Christmas wish and are appropriate on letters

and packages up to the first week in January. Help the cause by uning them liberally.
