PROCEEDINGS OF THE **BOARD OF SUPERVISORS**

Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors of Du Page County at a special meeting held in the Court House at Wheaton, on Saturday, the 5th day of July, A. D. 1913, pursuant to call of Chair.

Meeting called to order with Chair man Fischer presiding.

On roll call all members present. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

All claims and communication read and the bills referred to the proper committees.

It was moved by Supervisor Hammerschmidt that the so-called Batavia-Butterfield road in the County of Du Page, from the west line of Cook County to the east line of Kane County, be designated as a State Aid Road, and come under the provisions of an act of the legislature to revise the law in relation to roads and bridges, and that the accompanying map showing said road be adopted by the County Board of Du Page County. Motion declared carried.

The following resolution in regard to State road, on motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt was declared approved:

Whereas, the County Board of Du Page County has selected the Batavia-Butterfield Road in said county from the west line of Cook County to the east line of Kane County as one of the State Roads in the County of Du Page; and,

Whereas, the said road connects the city of Chicago with the cities of Elmhurst, Lombard, Glen Ellyn. Wheaton, West Chicago, Batavia and Aurora, and is one of the main thoroughfares traversing the central portion of said Du Page County; and,

Whereas, the said Batavia-Butterfield Road owing to the enormous traffic thereon is now out of repair and requires immediate repairs and improvements and the public interest demands the improving of said high-

way within said county; therefore, Be it resolved, by the Board of Supervisors in and for the county of Du Page and state of Illinois, in meeting duly assembled. That said road be constructed and improved by state and county aid as provided in an act of the legislature to revise the laws in relation to roads and bridges, in force July 1, 1913;

And that the County Clerk shall, within ten days after the passage of this resolution, transmit a certified copy thereof to the State Highway Commission.

On motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt the Board of Supervisors of Du Page County submitted the names of Messrs. Arthur L. Webster, Charles A. Prout and LaVerne J. Ruddock, whom the board consider desirable candidates for the office of County Superintendent of Highways, and request the State Highway Commission to appoint one of said persons as County Superintendent of Highways for Du Page County. Motion declared approved.

On motion of Supervisor Keller the board took a recess to 1:30 today.
