Lime is not a fertilizer in the sense we claim for a fertilizer, but is a soil acidity neutralizer and fits the soil so that fertilizers are made more available for the plants to use.

The addition of lime to sweeten the soil for leguminous crops is not a new fad but is centuries old. We believe the Chinese were the first users of lime as they have used it for two or three thousand years.

There is a vital relationship between the use of lime and a permanent soil fertility. When it comes to buying commercial fertilizers the most expensive one is the nitrate or that containing nitrogen.

An ordinance which provides for the levying of taxes for the fiscal year and which showed the following moneys to be appropriated was read:

For the maintenance of Public Library, \$634.00. For lighting streets and alleys, \$2,400.

For repairing streets and alleys, \$1,900.00.

For salaries of Village President, Trustees, Clerk, Treasurer, Attorney and Policemen of said village, \$2,000.00.

For salaries of Board of Local Improvements, \$1,000.00.

For wages of other employees and laborers and miscellaneous claims, \$840.00.

For interest on General Improvement bonds, \$750.00.

For sinking fund and payment of General Improvement bonds, \$2,000.00.

Total, \$9,724.00.

Upon motion of Trustees Littleford and Kellogg, tax levy ordinance was put upon its passage, all voting aye, nays none.

Trustee Mahoney presented the following resolution: Whereas, A deficit now exists in what is known as the Fire fund; and Whereas, It is desired that the sum of \$500.00 be transferred from the General fund of the Village of Downers Grove to the Fire fund of said Village; therefore be it

Resolved, by the Board of Trustees of said Village, That the sum stated above be and hereby is ordered transferred from the said General fund to the said Fire fund of said Village.

It was moved by Trustees Mahoney and Littleford that resolutions as read be adopted. Motion carried, all voting aye, nays none.

A communication was read from J. C. Dewitt requesting the Board to place lights opposite his premises on Gilbert Avenue. Upon motion of Trustees Mahoney and Handy, matter was referred to the Water and Light Committee with power to act.

Affidavit was read from F. D. Lindley as agent for fire insurance companies showing premiums collected by him and remitting to the Village \$18.08. Same was ordered placed on file.

Request from property owners on Highland Avenue outside corporation asking extension of water mains outside of village limits by attaching pipe to mains at Highland & Chicago Avenues, was read. After discussion action was deferred until next regular meeting.

E. E. Stanley had presented to the Board a warranty deed of a tract of land 12 feet wide running south from Curtis Street to village lot line for alley purposes, etc. It was moved by Trustees Handy and Hearst deed be accepted. Motion lost. Those voting aye were Trustees Handy and Hearst; nays, Trustees Haller, Kellogg, Littleford and Mahoney.

Trustee Hearst spoke to the Board about electric lights for the chalet. Upon motion of Trustees Kellogg and Hearst, matter was referred to the Water and Light Committee with power to act.

Request from the Chicago Telephone Co. for setting poles on Maple Avenue was, upon motion of Trustees Mahoney and Littleford, refused.

It was moved by Trustees Mahoney and Haller that the Street and Alley Committee take up with the Chicago Telephone Co. matter of pole line on Franklin Street from Highland Avenue to Oakwood Avenue, and notify them to complete original project of cable line at once or to remove poles from the street. Motion carried, all voting aye.

Trustee Mahoney spoke to the Board about ordinance for sale of franchise for electric light plant. It was decided to take the matter up at an adjourned meeting. Upon proper motion Board adjourned to July 22.
