## STATE AID SOUGHT **FOR COUNTRY ROADS**

Supervisors and Others Visit State Highway Commissioners.

The finance committee of the Board of Supervisors, including Supervisor and Major Town State's Attorney Hadley and C. H. enting the Wheaton Autombile with the State High and Commissioners at Spring-Wednesday and presented a formail request that DuPage county be given immediate consideration in the matter of state aid on some of the country roads.

DuPage was the first county to make a formal request for state aid. It was also the first county to send in its map as requested by the commission designating the state aid roads, and was the first county to present to the commission evidence of good faith to do their part from a financial end, as the appropriation of \$35,000 made by the board at Tuesday's meeting will call for a like amount to be appropriated by the state. This will give this county \$70,-000 at least as a working fund to

The matter of 30 or more "honor' convicts being furnished to work on the roads was taken up with the governor and he promised to grant the request as soon as possible.

Governor Dunne Issued Proclamation Asking for a General Cleaning

Calling attention to the enormbus loss of property and life by fire annually in the state of Illinois, Gov. Edward F. Dunne has issued a proclamation, through his secretary, set-Wm. Hammerschmidt, Wm. Yackley ting aside Thursday, October 9, as Fire Prevention Day.

The governor recommends that all used. residents of the state shall observe the day by instituting a general cleanup of rubbish, trash and waste, and inspecting heating apparatus and chimneys and that the same be placed in good condition before the time for the starting of the fires in the

The governor further asks that spe cial attention be given to the inspection of school premises and public institutions and that if necessary the local authorities shall pass better building regulations. It is also urged that in all public institutions and factories and places of large employment that fire drills shall be




