ELECTRIC MOTOR DEVISED BY F. BAKER MECHANICAL WONDER

Compact Mechanism a Boon to Jewelers-Twenty Horse-power in the Compass of Two Hands.

Fred Baker, jeweler in ordinary to his highness the citizen of Downers Grove, has perfected an electric motor which occupies small space on a desk or table, but which will generate from sixteen to twenty-five horse-power and run a jeweler's lathe or a dentist's drill for months without re-charging. A detailed description of the apparatus is impossible to the layman, but its efficient service is open to observation any day in the corner of Morris' drug store, where for the last four years Mr. Baker has been busy devising his wonderful machine.

Application for a patent has been granted and the necessary papers are to be issued in a few months. Meanwhile Friend Baker is making the motors and, better still, selling them in considerable numbers. The little box, with its high and low speed, without loss of power, was one of the marvels exhibited at the watchmakers' convention last month in the Sherman House, Chicago.


