ADDISON BANK ROBBERY

Assistant Cashier of Bank Dies from Wound.

Addison, in the northern part of this county, was the scene of a bold bank robbery and fatal shooting last Saturday morning.

Cashier E. W. Fischer, who was alone in the bank, was ordered to hand over loose cash, which amounted to \$167.

While Fischer was in the vault Rotermund entered the bank. He took in the situation and grappled and the bullet entered Rotermund's body just below the heart.

The entire county and neighboring cities were soon notified but no more was heard from the fleeing men until the abandoned auto was found near La Grange.

The bullet wound received by Rotermund proved fatal at 4 o'clock Sunday morning and the highwayman became a murderer.

Du Page county now has two murders in its list of recent crimes.

D. A. R. CONVENTION.

The conference paused during the business session to pay a memorial tribute to the Daughters who passed into the Great Beyond during last year, among whom were Mrs. La Verne Noyes, Mrs. Fairbanks and several Real Daughters, one of whom, Mrs. Orpha Parke Bovee, was a member of Downers Grove Chapter.

The visiting regents and delegates were regally entertained during the conference by the Dorothy Quincy Chapter, and the usual social functions given, which included a brilliant reception at the old Governor Wood mansion, which has been restored and with its wealth of old-time furniture and helios, is kept by the Historical Society of Quincy.
