Same Roosting Place and Carry Insects With Them.

Poultry, roosting in trees, is not exempt from insect enemies. This has been proved by the experience of many who make a business of raising poultry. An examination of the limbs of trees where the young flocks roost at night, before the birds liave been yarded and housed for the winter, will show countless numbers of mites resting under the loose bark. Chickens generally seek the same receting place night after night and carry insects with them. The tree becomes infested and the vermin increase in numbers with wonderful rapidity, finally sapping the vitality of the birds. 
A very few lice will speedily kill little turks. Dust them with Persian insect powder, and if you see and head lice, put just a little vaseline or sweet cream on the heads.

HOUSE OF APPROVED STYLE

Warm, Well-Built Structure is of Greatset Importance If Eggs Are Wanted in Cold Weather.

Next to the feed and a flock of good, purebred hene of a laying strain, a warm, well-built house is the greatest requisite if winter eggs are wanted. I am sending you a plan of my poultry house. This house will accommodate 150 to 200 hens, but an additional scratching shed should be provided for use on cold days when the flock cannot be turned out, says a Kansas writer in the Farmers' Mail and Breeze. The type of house provides more floor space for its size than any other kind I have seen. It also minimizes the labor in caring for the flock.

This house is 32 feet long, 16 feet wide, 5 feet high at the back, and ? feet in front. It is the open front

style of house with the open side facing the south. The four-foot opening in front is covered with wire netting and a muslin curtain is provided for use on cold and stormy nights.

Everything about the house is arranged with an eye to convenience. The roost frame is hinged at the back and may be raised and hooked to the cailing while cleaning. The dropping board directly underneath is also hinged to the wall, allowing it to be

In goose there are seven standard varieties, and apparently the most profitable are the Toulouse, a gray coose, weighing: Adult ganders, 20 pounds; young ganders, 18; old geese, ts; young geese, 15. They are very easy to raise if you have plenty of pasture for them to grase upon, and are very thrifty, rapid growers and exceedingly good eating.

The Embden is a white goose, and in weight is about the same as the Tououse and can be raised with about the same case and profit, feathers being a very profitable part of raising both lucks and geese.
