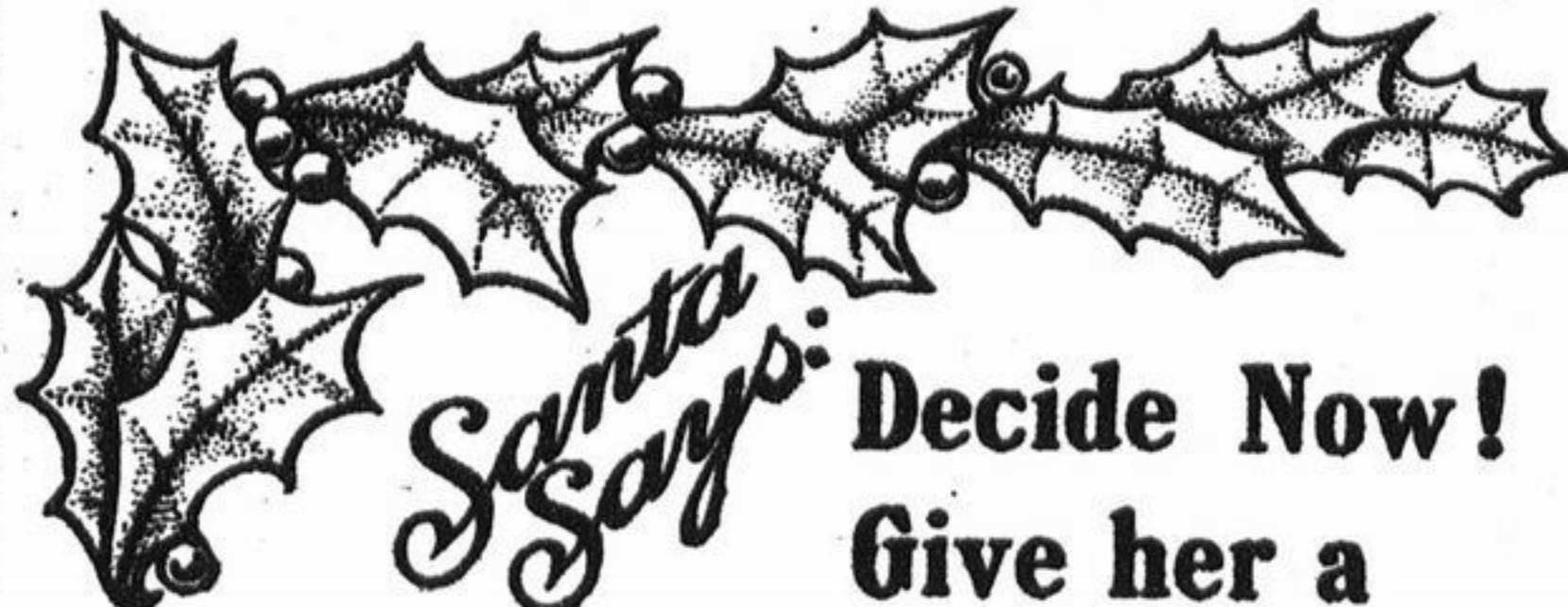

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE VILLAGE BOARD

Downers Grove, Ill., Oct. 20, 1913.
The Board met in special session pursuant to the provisions of an ordinance passed Sept. 22, 1913, to canvass the returns and declare the result of special election of October 18, 1913, with reference to bond issue of \$18,000 for the purpose of extending the water works and electric light system of the village.
The meeting was called to order by Clerk White.
Roll call noted present Trustees Handy, Haller, Heardt, Kellogg, Mahoney and Littleford. Absent, none.
It was moved by Trustees Handy and Haller that the Board proceed to canvass the vote of special election of October 18th. Motion carried, all voting aye.
The vote of said election was then canvassed, which canvass showed the following: Total number of votes cast, 257, as follows: For the issuing of bonds \$18,000: men, 131; women, 41; against the issuing of bonds, 78 votes: men, 61; women, 17.
It was moved by Trustees Littleford and Haller that the canvass of votes showing the proposition having received a majority of votes cast the proposition of issuing bonds in the amount of \$18,000 be declared carried. Motion carried. Those voting aye were Trustees Handy, Haller, Heardt, Kellogg, Mahoney and Littleford. Nays, none. President Backus declared motion carried.
Upon motion of Trustees Kellogg and Mahoney, Board adjourned.

Downers Grove, Ill., Oct. 23, 1913.
The Board met in special session called by President Backus to consider business mentioned in call, said call being on file in the Clerk's office. Meeting was called to order by Clerk White.
Roll call noted present Trustees Handy, Haller, Heardt, Kellogg, Mahoney and Littleford. Absent, none.
Call for meeting was read, which provided for the following: To discuss and consider resolutions pertaining to plans and specifications, purchase and installation of new equipment for the fire station, and all other business mentioned in the call and that start which will come under the provisions of the ordinance of Oct. 18, 1913.
After discussion, upon motion of Trustees Kellogg and Haller, Board

The regular meeting for the month of November, 1913, was called to order by Clerk White.
Roll call noted present Trustees Haller, Handy, Heardt, Kellogg and Littleford. Absent, Trustee Mahoney.
The minutes of Sept. 15, 22, Oct. 2, 9, 13, 20 and 23 were read and approved.
Report of Village Treasurer for month of October was read and ordered placed on file.
Report of Village Collector for month of October was read and ordered placed on file.
Monthly report of Superintendent of Water and Light was read and ordered placed on file.
Report of Village Collector on matters out of order was referred to the Water and Light Committee.
Claim ordinance No. 276, providing for the payment of certain claims, was read and was as follows:

It was moved by Trustees Kellogg and Heardt that ordinance be put upon its passage. Motion carried, all voting aye. Said claim ordinance was then passed. Those voting aye were Trustees Haller, Handy, Heardt, Littleford and Kellogg. Nays, none.
The following resolution was read: Whereas, electric lights are furnished the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy depot, the Village Hall and the Village Collector's office and the building occupied by the Fire Department, all in

the Village of Downers Grove, for which there are no meters and for which service no compensation has been credited heretofore to the water and light fund of said village; and whereas, it is the opinion of the Board of Trustees of said village that the said water and light fund should be credited with the value of the services rendered by the electric light plant to the aforesaid mentioned places; therefore be it resolved that the Superintendent be and is hereby authorized to install in said places electric light meters for the purpose of registering the amount of current consumed in said places, and that the Village Collector is hereby authorized to render bills to said village for the electric light current rendered to the aforesaid places, and that the bill so rendered be paid by the village out of its general fund.

Upon motion of Trustees Littleford and Kellogg, resolutions as read were adopted, all voting aye.
Trustee Kellogg presented the following resolution:
Whereas, the Board of Trustees of the village of Downers Grove met as a committee of the whole on Nov. 4, 1913, and whereas, we unanimously voted to draw specifications asking for sealed bids for two one-hundred horse power direct connected units; and whereas, there was considerable discussion regarding the advisability of so adjusting our specifications that we should be in the market for both oil and steam engines, it being argued that keener competition might possibly result in our securing a better bargain, inasmuch as, possibly two and not to exceed four or five competitors would be in the field with an oil engine; and whereas, a motion was defeated to make our specifications so read as to include steam as well as oil, the vote being three for and three against, and losing by the negative vote of the President; therefore be it resolved, that we reconsider the motion to so draw our specifications that we will be able to receive competitive bids for both oil and steam engines.
Trustees Kellogg and Haller moved the adoption of the resolution. Motion lost. Those voting aye were Trustees Kellogg and Haller. Nays, Trustees Heardt, Littleford and Handy.
A petition signed by various residents in Strabo addition, also Highland Acres addition, requesting additional street lights, was read and referred to the Water and Light Committee.
