Personally, I was in favor of selling the old plant, and we voted accordingly, believing that we were not in a position to enter such a technical field economically, and to relieve the VIIlage Board of a responsibility that it is not, either by training or association, particularly well qualified to han die. At best, the production of power and light is evolutionary; so much so, that even had our Village Board the necessary ability and money to install for us the most efficient and up-to-date plant at this time available, it would probably be obsolete long before it

was paid for. Fundamentally, we ourselves, as citizens, are responsible for the present unfortunate state of affairs, because when we had an opportunity to express our opinions at the polls, about two-thirds of the voting population failed to do so. Unless we get out and vote on these important questions we have only ourselves to blame when things go wrong. We tacitly leave our public affairs in the hands of a few enterprising and public spirited men, who not only select our various representatives, but, having spent a whole lot of their spare time and energy in deciding what is best for us, they are naturally disposed to resent any interference with their plans. Moreover, when it comes to a vote they are "there with the goods," and VOTES

If, therefore, you happen to be one of the delinquents who failed to vote on the questions leading up to our present unfortunate predicament, you are hardly in a position to blame the Village Board, whose greatest indiscretions seem to have been in so willingly accepting a responsibility that better informed men would have hesitated to assume.
