Whereas, the Board of Directors of the Association of Commerce of Naperville appeared in person before the Council of the City of Naperville, Ill. and represented to the Council the grave situation existing in the vicinity of the City of Naperville, Ill., because of the foot and mouth disease, and rep resented that immediate effective action ought to be taken to remedy the present condition and,

Whereas, it appears that the herds of cattle and hogs of approximately 29 farmers in the towns of Liste and Naperville have been already condemned by the Government agents and ordered destroyed because o such disease, and of which number the herds of 26 thereof have already been slaughtered; and,

Whereas, such condemned berds have a value of about \$125,000 and the same have become and are now total loss to such farmers; and,

All bills and communications on file Whereas, the farmers whose herd have been so condemned have no certain assurance that they will receive adequate compensation speedily or in fact that they will receive compensation at all at any time; and,

Whereas, the farmers whose herds have been so condemned and destroyed will be seriously injured finanassured them quickly, and in consequence thereof our community will suffer a direct injury.

Be it therefore resolved, by the Council of the City of Naperville, with personally appear before the Legislature of this State in Springfield and ask that body to pass immediate emergency measures providing delegate to La Salle \$ 11.40 for the speedy relief of the farmers so affected, as well as those who may 8.75 hereafter become affected, and providing for the speedy payment by the 3.50 State to them of adequate compensation for all losses sustained by such farmers because of such disease and its eradication.

CONSTITUTION. OF DOWNERS GROVE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Article I.-Name.

Section 1. The name of this association shall be The Downers Grove Athletic Association. Object.

Sec. 2. The object shall be the intellectual, social and physical welfare of the young men of Downers Grove,

Article II. Qualifications of Members. Section 1. Any male resident Downers Grove, Illinois, may become a member of this organization by pay ment of initiation fee and dues and by conforming to the Rules and Regulations as set forth in the Constitution and By-Laws, except those attending the public schools.

Article III .- Meetings of the Associa-

Section 1. The regular meeting shall be held the first Monday of each month. The annual meeting shall be held the first Monday after Jan. 1 of each year.

Rules of Order.

Sec. 2. The rules contained in "Robert's Rules of Order" shall govern the Association in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the By-Laws of this Association.

Article IV.--Amendments. Section 1. Amendments to this Constitution shall require for their adoption a presentation at the previous regular business meeting, and a twothirds vote of the members present.

Article V .-- Committees. Section 1. All committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise specified.

Executive Committee.

Sec. 2. Shall consist of the officers of the association, together with the heads of the various committees, and shall have the power to act for the to the dead letter office on Feb. 18 Association in cases of emergency. Schedule Committee. Sec. 3. The Schedule Committee shall arrange the schedule of games and determine the nights on which the men shall use the gymnasium. The Athletic Directors shall be members ex-officio of this committee.

Auditing Committee. Sec. 4. They shall audit all accounts and present a report at the end of each term of officers and at such other times as the Executive Committee shall direct.

> By-Laws. Article I .- Dues.

Section 1. The initiation fee shall be seventy-five cents and the dues shall be seventy-five cents for each

quarter year, payable in advance. Sec. 2. The privileges of the Association shall be denied anyone who is not in possession of his card showing dues paid.

Sec. 3. Failure to procure his membership card within thirty days of expiration of the previous quarterly card shall be cause for dropping a man's name from the roll of the Association and he shall be reinstated only upon presenting new application and paying initiation fee and dues.

Article II.-Conduct Section 1. Members shall conduct themselves properly while in building or on the playing field. smoking or drinking will be allowed in Just or about the building.


