OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE VILLAGE BOARD

Downers Grove, Ill., Dec. 14, 1915.
The regular meeting of the month of December was called to order by Clerk Potter. Roll call noted present Trustees Littleford, Handy, Hearty, Haller, Kellogg and Kidwell. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved. Reports of village officers read and ordered placed on file.

PROCEEDINGS OF BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors of Du Page County at a special meeting held at the Court House in Wheaton, on Saturday, the 9th day of January, A. D. 1915, pursuant to a call of Chair.

Meeting called to order with Chairman Fischer presiding. On roll call, all members present except Supervisor Hattendorf. Minutes of last preceding meeting read and declared approved. All bills and communications on file read to the full Board and the claims referred to the proper committees.

On motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt, the Board adjourned till one o'clock today. On reconvening for the afternoon session, committee on claims made the following report, which upon motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt was declared approved.

The following resolutions were presented by Supervisor Keller to the full Board, and on motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt were declared approved and adopted.

Whereas, the Board of Directors of the Association of Commerce of Naperville appeared in person before the Council of the City of Naperville, Ill., and represented to the Council the grave situation existing in the vicinity of the City of Naperville, Ill., because of the foot and mouth disease, and represented that immediate effective action ought to be taken to remedy the present condition; and

Whereas, it appears that the herds of cattle and hogs of approximately 29 farmers in the towns of Lisle and Naperville have been already condemned by the Government agents and ordered destroyed because of such disease, and of which number the herds of 26 thereof have already been slaughtered; and

Whereas, such condemned herds have a value of about \$125,000 and the same have become and are now a total loss to such farmers; and

Whereas, the farmers whose herds have been so condemned have no certain assurance that they will receive adequate compensation speedily or in fact that all at any time; and

Whereas, the farmers whose herds have been so condemned and destroyed will be seriously injured financially unless certain compensation be assured them quickly, and in consequence thereof our community will suffer a direct injury.

Be It therefore resolved, by the Council of the City of Naperville, Ill., that the County Board of Du Page County, Illinois, be requested to forth with personally appear before the Legislature of this State in Springfield and ask that body to pass immediate emergency measures providing for the speedy relief of the farmers so affected, as well as those who may hereafter become affected, and providing for the speedy payment by the State to them of adequate compensation for all losses sustained by such farmers because of such disease and its eradication.

Be it further resolved, that a copy of the resolutions be forthwith submitted to the County Board of Du Page County, Illinois, and that the same be spread upon the records of this Council.

On motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt, the Chairman was authorized, as a committee of one, to communicate with Senator Barr, and if necessary to have the full board to go to Springfield, to ask the legislature to make an immediate appropriation to pay for the loss of stock, with the foot and mouth disease, in Du Page County.

The following resolution was read to the full Board, and on motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt and seconded by Supervisor Town, was declared approved and adopted:

Whereas, the Hon. Maxmill Slusser, one of the Judges of the Sixteenth Judicial Circuit of Illinois, is a candidate for re-election; and Whereas, the said Judge Slusser has in the past rendered able, efficient and valuable services as such Judge, and is in the opinion of this Board eminently qualified for this position, and in view of his superior qualifications, is entitled to re-election.

PLEASURE FOR THE LOBSTER
