R. C. GRAVELEY RESIGNS.

The Consumption of Gas Has Made Rapid Strides Under His Management.

Richard C. Graveley, who has been district manager of the Western United Gas and Electric Company at LaGrange since 1909, tendered his resignation to that concern a month ago. Up to last Monday Mr. Graveley performed the duties of manager. Last Monday, C. J. Carlson, who is to succeed Mr. Graveley, took charge of Canada. the company's affairs here.

Mr. Graveley has been in ill health for some time, and with the constant strain of business affairs has desired for a change. Mr. Graveley has been in the gas business for 15 years. Before coming to LaGrange, he was with the Hanover Gas Company of Hanover, Pa., for a year. He has been with the LaGrange branch for five years and in that time has tried to give the people of LaGrange the very best service that was possible.

LaGrange enjoyed its first gas in Real towns are not made by men 1901 when the LaGrange Gas Company opened its mains, charging the rate of \$1.00 per 1,000 feet. In 1902 LaGrange Park and Brookfield were supplied. In 1903 Hinsdale began to have the use of the mains laid by the LaGrange Gas Co. and in 1904 Downers Grove and Western Springs were supplied. Clarendon Hills secured its first gas in 1913.

On February 1, 1911, the old rate of \$1.00 was lowered to 95 cents per 1,000 feet of gas, because of the increased sales and the decrease in the cost of production. January 1, 1913, the second and last reduction during Mr. Graveley's term of service was made, to 90 cents, because of the improved methods of production. Mr. Graveley says that only two other places give a cheaper rate of gas, Chicago with its rate of 80 cents, and Peoria, with a rate of 85 cents.

In 1905 LaGrange Gas Co., along with the companies of Aurora, Eigin and Joliet, were consolidated into the present Western United Gas and Electric Co.

Mr. Graveley will take a thorough rest before entering the gas business again. He likes the gas business, understands it perfectly and will later on enter that line again. At present he is content to make his home in LaGrange. He has been over the United States, England and Africa, and likes LaGrange as a home better than any locality that he has ever previously lived in.—LaGrange News.
