MATTER OF OFFICE HOURS
Diverging Opinions of Two Managers as to Attaining Results Are of Interest.

Two men with offices in the Wall street district, each employing a clerical force of a dozen persons, were talking shop at luncheon the other day and one said he was an early riser and usually was at the office before any of the clerks.

"I'm an early riser, too, and get up because I like to," said the other, "but I never get to my office before nine o'clock, a half hour after the office opens for business. I do this because after considerable experience and observation I found that it is more effective with the employees."

"They are shrewd folk, they are, and have their own methods of doing up the hose, and I find that they conclude that the employee who gets to his office early, either needs the extra time to do his work in or he wants to see that his employees are not leaving him on him. Either of these conclusions is in my opinion, as to the benefit of the employer."

"I don't know, but I have personally tried them to be on time, and I find that I can do my part of the work in less time than they can. I can't always, but when I can't I do it at home, where they can't see me or know anything about it. I respect my people, and they respect me, and I don't have to get to the office early to do it, either."
