RIVERSIDE DEFEATED.

Locals Win Last Game of Season, 8-7.

In a seaway battle which was not decided until two were out in the ninth, when H. Jorgensen cracked a single over second, scoring Curtiss with the winning run, the purple defeated Riverside High, 8-7. The game was filled with both good and weird plays by both sides. The fastest double play pulled by the locals this season saved Jorgensen some trouble. O'Leary led off with a single. Stetson clouted one just inside the third base line. It looked like a sure single, but Mochel dashed over and scooped up the ball and started a lightning double play, Mochel to Davenport to Curtiss. The sloppiest double play ever pulled any time was made by Riverside in the seventh. With men on first and second, Nash cracked one to left which looked like a hit. But Wright, who bats like E. David but fields like our own Norman Anderson, raced over and made a very difficult catch. He then chucked the pill about a mile, eight feet and six inches over the second baseman's head. But luck was with Riverside, for the ball hit about half way between first and second and rolled right into the first sacker's mitts, beating Anderson by a hair.

The "purple" scored one in the first and four in the third. Riverside scored one in the second, two in the sixth and went one to the good in the eighth by scoring four. But Coach Robinson's squad showed some of their fighting spirit by winning out in the ninth. Mochel started the fireworks with a single. Johnson forced Mochel. The shortstop tossed out Anderson. Lockie struck one of his curve balls into Nash's ribs. Jorgensen came across in the pinch with a ringing single over second, scoring Johnson and Nash.

Thus, the last game of the season, was a win for the locals. The purple made some showing this year, winning eight out of ten games. Manager Anderson tried to book a return game with Naperville and Wendell Phillips (the two teams which defeated Downers) for last week but was unable to do so. William Shanabrook and Frank Burns umpired this game and most of the others.

Their work, both in calling balls and strikes and base decisions, was above par, as it has been all season. These two umpes deserve and should receive at least a vote of thanks if nothing else from the high school for their efficient work. Score:
