The President thereupon appointed as such committee the new Finance Committee, Kellogg, Kidwell and Haller.

On proper motion meeting adjourned sine die.

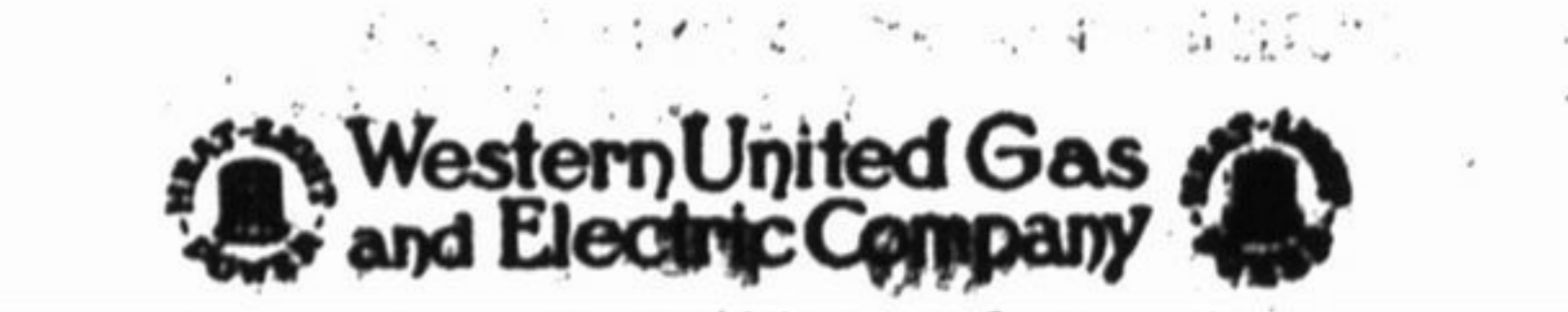
