
Pincushions With Natural Flowers, is Pleasing Ornament to Oreseing .Table-Charming Table Center for Home Working.



EDUCATIONAL BUREAU DOING A REALLY GOOD WORK.

Venture Which Was the Idea of the Late Edward H. Harriman Is Likely to Spread to All the Lines. of the Country.

As a result of the generosity and farsightedness of the late Edward H Harriman, a unique plan for the bet erment of railroad employees throughout the United States has made rapid progress in the last two years. This Hox jackets plan, which Mr. Harriman conceived and caused to be put into operation on the Union Pacific railroad, was the forming of an educational bureau through whose offices the employees of the Harriman lines were offered an opportunity to increase their capacity to assume greater responsibilities to fit themselves for promotion.

good manners. If "safety first" is a good slogan "courtesy second" is just as good. Time was in this country when busy and energetic men assumed tacitly that in trade and commerce manners were of no consequence. So long as the goods were "delivered," what did mere words matter? Why waste preclous moments-which any statistician could multiply into staggering periods of time and enormous losses of money on "please" and "thank you?" Why


not leave all such empty and useless the Nautilus. formalities to the absurdly ceremonious Latins and show the world that business can be transacted in a downright and swift manner?
