NEW HIGH SCHOOL PRIVILEGE ACT

The forty-ninth general assembly which has just adjourned enacted new law regarding the payment high school tuition and giving high school privileges to all eighth grade Just as it con

The act of 1913 provided that the local school board should pay the thition while the new law makes it the duty of the county superintendent to pay the taition out of the state distributive fund before apportioning it to the different townships.

The parent or guardian shall select the high school to be attended subject to the consent of the high school board and the approval of the county superintendent. Unless sufficient reasons are given

to the county superintendent pupili shall attend a high school in the coun ty where such pupil resides. The tuition paid shall never

greater than the per capita cost maintaining the high school selected The high school selected must be public high school providing a course of two or more years of work approve by the superintendent of public ! struction.
