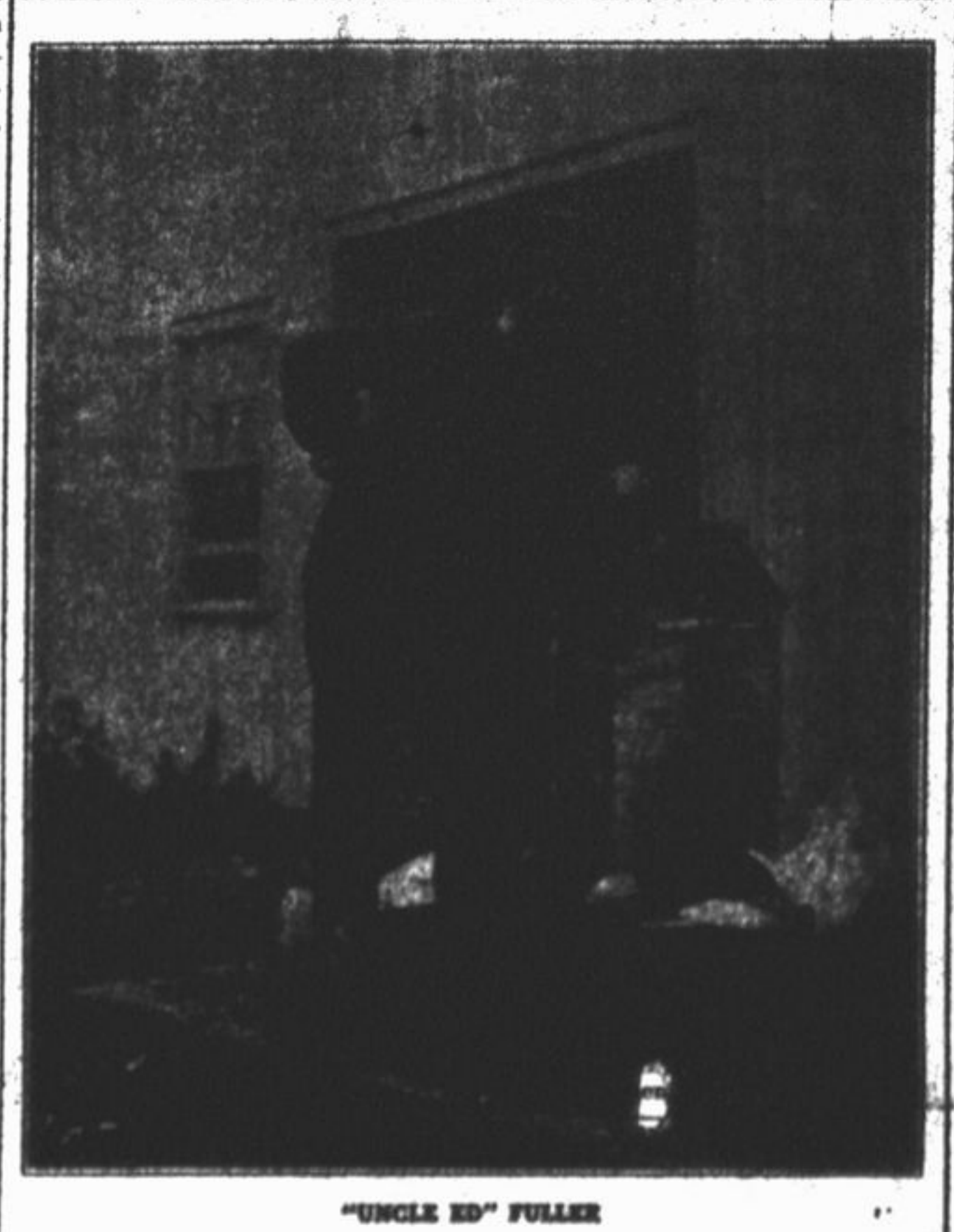


MEETING OF THE BOARD

LEO M. FRANK LYNCHED

Marietta, Ga., Aug. 17.—Leo Frank, serving a life term for murder of Mary Phagan, the Atlanta factory girl, and who was taken to the prison farm at Milledgeville last night, was lynched two miles of here today by the armed mob. Frank was brought 100 miles to the prison farm to a point within sight of the former home of Mary Phagan.

Frank's body, however, was only in prison two days and was taken at 2 p. m. to the home of Y. M. C. A. With them will come a mob of men, who should be kept out of the state.

JACK PIETZYK IS KILLED WHILE RIDING FREIGHT.

While riding a freight train from Hawthorne bound for his home in East Grove, Jack Pietzyk, sagman at the Maple avenue crossing, fell from the train and sustained injuries which led to his death.

He went to Chicago Sunday and was robbed of his money. Not having any method of getting more, he sought to return to his home on a freight train leaving the Hawthorne yard. It is not known how he became dislodged from his position, but he fell between the wheels, the train running over him and cutting off both legs and an arm. He was rushed to St. Anthony's Hospital, but died before morning. He leaves a wife and one child to mourn his sudden death.
