Change in Ermine's Color.

For long it was thought that the hairs composing the fur of the ermine, brown in summer and white in winter, could not change their color, the idea being that the difference in the hue of the summer and winter coats of the animal lay solely in the fact that, at the beginning of winter, the summer coat was shed and a new one of snowy whiteness took its place. Resent experiments with these animals, however, indicate that, in the case of an armine wearing a summer coat, its brown fur will, if subjected to a lowering temperature, become white and with no shedding of the hair. It should he added, however, that it is quite true that the ordinary winter garb of the ermine is donned only when the summer cost is discarded.
