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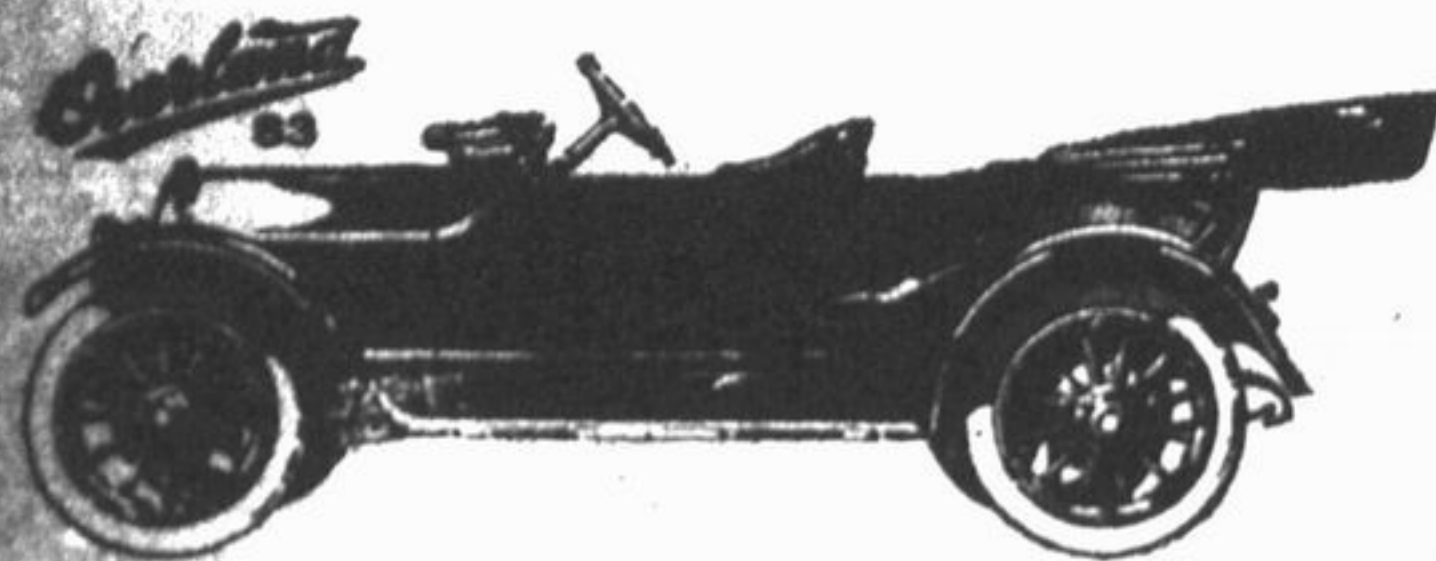

TO THE VOTERS OF DOWNERS GROVE

On Saturday, September 18, between the hours of 7 a. m. and 3 p. m., you will be asked to vote on the proposition, "Shall the Village of Downers Grove adopt the Commission Form of Municipal Government?"

The law governing this form of government is so lengthy, and as we feel that the citizens should be acquainted with at least the intent of the law—we beg leave to extract a few of the most vital points and present them for your worthy consideration.

By adoption of this law it is intended to cast any reflection whatsoever on the present Board of Trustees but it is intended to place the affairs of the village on an up-to-date business basis. Under this form of government the citizens can, at any time, acquaint themselves with the affairs of the village by applying to the Village Clerk for the monthly report, in pamphlet form, required by law.

AFFAIRS.

The executive and administrative powers, authority and duties in such cities and villages shall be distributed into and among five departments, as follows:

1. Department of public affairs.
2. Department of accounts and finances.
3. Department of public health and safety.
4. Department of streets and public improvements.
