OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS
BOARD OF SUPERVISORS
 of the Board, Chairman Fischer appointed as delegates to the State Association of Supervisors, County Commissioners and County Clerks to be held in Springfield, Supervisors Irving Goodrich, E. B. Stearns, George Fitz and County Clerk A. A. Kuhn.
 On motion of Supervisor Hamerschmidt, Supervisor Boger, Chairman of County Farm Committee, Superintendent and Matron Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Standidge were appointed delegates to represent Du Page County at the Illinois State Conference of Charities to be held at Danville, Illinois, on October 23, 24, 25 and 26, 1915.
 The following resolution in regard to the construction and payment of the cost of building State Aid roads in Du Page County was, on motion of Supervisor Boger, declared approved and adopted:
 Whereas, The State Highway Commission of the State of Illinois has awarded a contract to Thos. H. Cutler to build and construct Section B of Route 1 of the State Aid roads in Du Page County, for the sum of forty-four hundred eighty dollars (\$4,480.00); and
 Whereas, One-half the costs of said State Aid road is to be paid one-half by the State and one-half by the county; and
 Whereas, Estimates are to be made each month by the engineers of the State Highway Commission, showing the amount due the general contractor, now, therefore, be it
 Resolved, by the Board of Supervisors of Du Page County, in meeting duly assembled, That A. A. Kuhn, County Clerk of said Du Page County, or his successor in office, be and they are hereby authorized and directed to draw orders upon the County Treasurer of said county of Du Page in favor of the said Thos. H. Cutler for the amount due said contractor, as provided in the monthly estimate to be furnished by the State Highway Commission, the same not to exceed proportion of said estimate due him from the said county.

The following recommendation of Superintendent Goodrich that the claim of A. L. Webster, for stamps, amounting to \$7.00, be paid, on condition that no more claims for supplies from the County Surveyor's office be received, and that the county pay for the extension of the telephone in the County Surveyor's office, but that the County Surveyor pay for all tolls was, on motion of Supervisor Hamerschmidt, declared approved.
 On motion of Supervisor Hamerschmidt, the Court House and Grounds Committee was authorized to build an ash house in front of the power house, with power to act.
 On motion of Supervisor Hamerschmidt, the Board adjourned to call of Chair.

BOSTON OPERA COMPANY OPENS AT AUDITORIUM OCTOBER 4.

"The Dumb Girl of Portici" and "The Love of the Three Kings" to be Presented.
 The season of opera by the Boston company and the Pavlova Ballet Russe will open at the Auditorium on Monday evening, Oct. 4, with "The Dumb Girl of Portici" or, to use the Italian title, "La Muta di Portici." For years this opera has not been attempted, the difficulties of gathering a cast which could meet the requirements of the

opera being almost insuperable.
 This opera—it is rather a mimodrama grand opera—has for its heroine a dumb girl, who, denied the power of speech, must, perforce, express herself in pantomime. Where is the prima donna who would do this, even if she could? Pavlova will have the role of Fenella in the Boston opera company's presentation. Felice Lyne, George Machaloff—the new Russian baritone—Kenatello and Fely Clement complete the principals of the cast. The complete Pavlova ballet will participate.
