VILLAGE ORDINANCE
 AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE OPERATION OF VEHICLES AND PRESCRIBING RULES THEREFOR.
 BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Downers Grove, Ill.:

SECTION 1. Definitions. (a) The term "vehicle" as used in this Ordinance shall mean and include all automobiles, motor trucks, motorcycles and vehicles propelled by gasoline, gas, kerosene, electricity or other mechanical power, carriages, wagons and other vehicles drawn or propelled by horses, mules or other animal power, and bicycles.
 (b) The term "business district" as used in this Ordinance shall mean and include the closely built up business portion of said Village which is hereby disclosed to be and include the following territory and streets in said Village, Main St. beginning at the intersection with the intersection of Warren Ave. and Main St.; also 200 ft. east and 200 ft. west from the center of all intersecting streets between and including Warren Ave. and Main St.; also 200 ft. east and 200 ft. west from the center of its intersection with Belmont Ave.; Belmont Ave. for a distance of 200 ft. west from the center of its intersection with Forest Ave.
 (c) The term "residence district" as used in this Ordinance shall mean and include the residence portion of said Village, and is hereby disclosed to be and include all other streets and public thoroughfares of said Village except those in the "business district."

SECTION 2. That every driver of a vehicle on any street in said Village shall drive in a careful manner with due regard for the safety and convenience of pedestrians and other vehicles.
 SECTION 3. That the driver of every vehicle shall turn to the right when meeting another vehicle proceeding in the same direction on the right hand side of the street, as near the curb as possible.
 SECTION 4. That the driver of every vehicle before stopping, turning, backing, or changing the course of such vehicle shall first make certain there is sufficient space to make such movement in safety for other vehicles and pedestrians on such street. Before turning the corner of any street the driver of every vehicle shall give a signal by raising his hand so that such hand can be plainly seen from behind such vehicle, upon the left or right side, as the case may be, and such signal shall be given in a manner which shall plainly indicate the direction in which such vehicle is about to turn, and before coming to a stop, the driver of every vehicle shall give a signal with his hand upon the left side, plainly indicating his intention to stop.

SECTION 5. That the driver of every vehicle in turning from one street into another, if he turns to the right, shall turn the corner as near the curb as possible, if he turns to the left he shall pass to the right of and beyond the center line of the street to be turned, before turning; if the driver desires to cross from one side of the street to the other side thereof he shall pass to the left as to head in the direction in which traffic is moving.
 SECTION 6. That no vehicle shall stop upon any street in said Village except in the direction in which traffic is moving on the side of such street where the stop may be made, and with the right side of the vehicle next to the curb, and the same has been loaded or unloaded, it shall be moved from such position, and all animals attached to a vehicle backed up to a curb shall be turned at right angles to such vehicle, headed in the direction in which traffic is moving.
 SECTION 7. That it shall be unlawful for any intoxicated person to drive any vehicle upon any street or public thoroughfare in said Village.
 SECTION 8. That it shall be unlawful to operate a motor vehicle with power supplied by gas, gasoline, or kerosene or gas unless the same is provided with a muffler properly attached to such vehicle, and of such construction and so attached that the same shall prevent the escape of the exhaust from such vehicle, and it shall be unlawful to operate any such vehicle without such muffler, and when the engine or motor thereof is passed through such muffler so that the sound of such exhaust shall be effectively eliminated.
 SECTION 9. That no vehicle operated by gas, gasoline, kerosene, electricity or other mechanical power shall be left standing on any street or public thoroughfare in said Village with the engine or motor thereof running or in operation, without an attendant in the vehicle.

SECTION 10. That every vehicle shall carry during the period from sunset to sunrise, showing white lights, visible 200 feet at least, in the direction toward which the vehicle is moving, and shall also carry at least one light of lamp which shall be so situated as to show a red light visible in the reverse direction, provided that bicycles and other two wheeled vehicles with power drawn and propelled by hand or foot shall be required to carry but one such light which shall be visible in the reverse direction in the direction toward which such vehicle is proceeding or is faced, and a light visible at least 200 feet in reverse direction, which shall be placed or fixed on the left side of said vehicle so as to be plainly visible and free from obstructions.
 SECTION 11. That it shall be unlawful to operate any vehicle upon the streets of said Village with a gas, electric or other bright head light, the rays from which shall be intensified by any parabolic, condensing or any other reflector in the rear of such light, unless such light shall be properly shielded so as not to blind or dazzle other users of the highway, or make it difficult or unsafe for them to ride, drive or walk thereon.
 SECTION 12. That every vehicle overtaking another vehicle, moving in the same direction, shall pass to the left side of the overtaken vehicle; such overtaken vehicle when requested shall turn to the right to give way to the overtaking vehicle, according to the state laws of Illinois in such cases made and provided.
 SECTION 13. That all vehicles operated by mechanical power upon the streets of said Village shall be provided with good and sufficient brakes and also a suitable bell, horn or other signal device upon any vehicle operated upon the streets of said Village that is not soundly or operated unbecomingly.
 SECTION 14. That no person shall drive any vehicle upon any street or public thoroughfare in said Village at a speed greater than is reasonable and proper, having regard to the traffic and the use of the way, or so as to endanger the life or limb or injure the property of any person, or so as to not to blind or dazzle other users of the highway, or make it difficult or unsafe for them to ride, drive or walk thereon.
 SECTION 15. That no person shall drive any vehicle upon any street in said Village within said business district at a speed exceeding twelve miles per hour, and no person shall drive or operate or cause to be driven or operated any vehicle upon any street in said Village within said residence district, at a speed exceeding eighteen (18) miles per hour; and any rate of speed in excess of the rates herein prescribed shall be prima facie evidence that the person who is operating such vehicle is causing such vehicle to be operated in a reckless and improper manner, and such person shall be liable for the same as if he were negligent, and any rate of speed in excess of any person or any rate of speed in said business district or said residence district.

SECTION 16. That no person shall operate any vehicle upon any street in said Village at a speed in excess of the rates herein prescribed, and any person who is operating such vehicle at a speed in excess of the rates herein prescribed shall be prima facie evidence that the person who is operating such vehicle is causing such vehicle to be operated in a reckless and improper manner, and such person shall be liable for the same as if he were negligent, and any rate of speed in excess of any person or any rate of speed in said business district or said residence district.

SECTION 17. That no person shall operate any vehicle upon any street in said Village at a speed in excess of the rates herein prescribed, and any person who is operating such vehicle at a speed in excess of the rates herein prescribed shall be prima facie evidence that the person who is operating such vehicle is causing such vehicle to be operated in a reckless and improper manner, and such person shall be liable for the same as if he were negligent, and any rate of speed in excess of any person or any rate of speed in said business district or said residence district.

SECTION 18. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.
 SECTION 19. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after thirty days after its passage.
