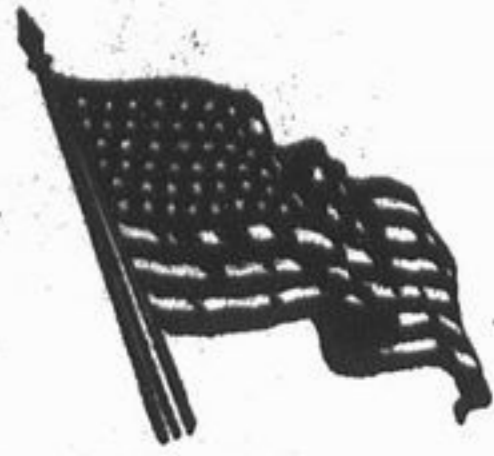

The Grand Jury selected, summoned, empaneled and sworn for the October Term, A. D. 1915, of said Court, beg leave to report that they have examined all complaints made to them, and that seven true bills were voted, which are herewith returned into Court, and they also report that three no bills were voted.

The Grand Jury would further report that they have examined the Court House and grounds and they find the same in excellent condition, well cared for, and the Court House showing great pains on the part of Janitor Albert Brannigan.

They would further report, that they have examined the County Jail and they find the inmates well cared for, the jail clean and wholesome, and they wish to commend the able manner in which Sheriff John Hesterman is conducting the affairs at the County Jail.

They would also report that they have examined the County Farm and the buildings thereon, and they find that the inmates are well housed, well clothed and well cared for and their wants abundantly provided for, and they wish to commend the able and efficient manner in which Mr. and Mrs. Standidge are looking after the wards of the county and the property of the county at the County Farm.

They would further report that they wish to commend the action of the Board of Supervisors in providing for the erection of an Isolation Hospital and Tubercular Colony at the County Farm, as they believe that said buildings are essential to the welfare and the health of the entire county.

They also wish to commend the action of the Board of Supervisors in the enlargement of the Treasurer's office in the Court House and the contemplated enlargement of the boiler rooms.

The said Grand Jury would further report that they have not as yet concluded their deliberations and they would ask leave to make this partial report and to continue their investigations.
