The campaign for preparedness and peace is gaining momentum. Fostered by the National Security League, the Navy League and other organizations which believe that peace is best attained through preparedness, it is gathering many new recruits to its banner. Commodore J. Stuart Black ton, author of the photoplay, "The Battle Cry of Peace," which is one of the most remarkable propaganda efforts ever made, in a speech before a select **Budlence** recently stated that Congress would probably appropriate \$500,000, 999 in the next five years for navy construction; \$105,000,000 within four years for reserve material such as arms and ammunition; \$81,000,000 in four years for modernization of old forts and the construction of new coast defences.
