On motion of Supervisor Boger, the Board adjourned to 1:30 p. m. On reconvening for the afternoon session, the following resolution of the Finance Committee, reducing the clerk hire of the office of the Circuit Clerk of DuPage County, was recommended to the Board of Supervisors, and on motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt was declared approved and adopted and the Clerk was requested to give a copy of said resolution to the Circuit Clerk.

Whereas, the County Board of Supervisors of DuPage County recently fixed the clerk hire for the office of Circuit Clerk of DuPage County and ex-officio Recorder of Deeds of said DuPage County at thirty-six hundred dollars (\$3,600) per year; and Whereas, the said Board of Supervisors of said DuPage County have ascertained that said sum is in excess of the amount of clerk hire required to conduct said office and that twenty-eight hundred dollars (\$2,800) will be a sufficient allowance.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, by said Board of Supervisors of said DuPage County, Illinois, in meeting duly assembled, that said clerk hire for the office of Circuit Clerk of DuPage County, Illinois, and ex-officio Recorder of Deeds of said county be reduced from thirty-six hundred dollars (\$3,600) per year to twenty-eight hundred dollars (\$2,800) per year, commencing October 15th, A. D. 1915, and that said clerk hire be and is hereby fixed at the sum of twenty-eight hundred dollars (\$2,800) per year beginning October 15th, A. D. 1915.

Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors of DuPage County at an adjourned meeting held at the Court House in Wheaton on Friday, the 22nd day of October, A. D. 1915, pursuant to adjourn.

Meeting called to order with Chairman Fischer presiding. On roll call all members present. Minutes of last preceding meeting read and declared approved.

On motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt the Board took a recess for twenty minutes.

On reconvening, the following resolution on State Aid Road No. 1, was on motion of Supervisor Hammerschmidt, declared approved and adopted:

PRELIMINARY RESOLUTION OF COUNTY BOARD REQUESTING IMPROVEMENT OF A PUBLIC HIGHWAY AS A STATE AID ROAD. RESOLVED, That the public interest demands the improvement as a State Aid Road of the section of public highway described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the public highway designated as proposed State Aid Road, Route No. 1, said point being at the westerly end of Section A of said State Aid Road No. 1 and extending thence along said route in a westerly direction for a distance of 4 miles, more or less.

Be it further Resolved, That we, the County Board, specify that (of the following types of road improvement authorized by law, viz: Earth, gravel, macadam, concrete and macadam combined, or brick) the proposed improvement designated herein shall be of macadam with bituminous top and asphalt fill.

And it is requested that the aforesaid described section of highway be improved as a State Aid Road, and the County Clerk is hereby directed to transmit a copy of this resolution to the State Highway Commission within ten (10) days of the date hereof, said date being the 22nd day of October, 1915, as provided in Section 18, Article IV, of an "Act to Revise the Law in Relation to Roads and Bridges," approved June 27th, 1913, and all amendments thereto.

On motion of Supervisor Goodrich the plat of Bauer's Subdivision of part of the S. W. 1/4 of Sec. 7, Twp. 33 N., R. 10 E. of the 3rd P. M., and of the S. E. 1/4 of Sec. 12, Twp. 33 N., R. 10 E. of the 3rd P. M. was declared approved.

On motion of Supervisor Fix the plat of a subdivision known as D. J. Worth's Lot "A" being a consolidation of Block 15 and the north 108-100 acres of Block 12 of E. W. Zander & Company's Country Homes Addition to Glen Ellyn, DuPage County, Illinois, was declared approved.

On motion of Supervisor Goodrich the County Farm Committee was instructed to draw plans and specifications to build an isolation hospital, and present same to the Board at some future meeting to be passed upon by said Board.

On motion of Supervisor Boger the Board adjourned to call of Chair. A. A. KUHN, Clerk.

CAMPAIGN FOR PREPAREDNESS. The campaign for preparedness and peace is gaining momentum. Fostered by the National Security League, the Navy League and other organizations which believe that peace is best attained through preparedness. It is gathering many new recruits to its banner. Commodore J. Stuart Blackton, author of the photoplay, "The Battle Cry of Peace," which is one of the most remarkable propaganda efforts ever made, in a speech before a select audience recently stated that Congress would probably appropriate \$500,000,000 in the next five years for navy construction; \$105,000,000 within four years for reserve material such as arms and ammunition; \$81,000,000 in four years for modernization of old forts and the construction of new coast defenses. For the new continental army, he said, and the proposed increase in the regular army, \$28,000,000. This would mean a total appropriation for the next five years of \$42,000,000. "I believe I have shown in 'The Battle Cry of Peace,'" said Commodore Blackton, "just what would happen to America if she were attacked. I purposely used the photoplay because pictures are so much more vivid than words and convey so much more. When people see Times Square blown up and homes invaded, it sets them wild to prepare proper defenses. The campaign for 'peace through preparedness' is taking like wildfire, and I hope everyone will give us his assistance freely."

Wireless Electricity. The requirement for accuracy in railway watches in particular, and for others as well, is becoming more exacting every day. Horologists are at their wits' end to meet them. The time is surely coming when a purely mechanical device will no longer suffice to produce sufficient accuracy. What then? Some other force of nature must be enlisted. What will it be? What else, but that mysterious force, electricity? That wonderful power which is being harnessed to lighten man's burdens and minister to his wants and pleasures. Yes; wireless electricity is destined to solve the problem - Scientific American.
