PLAN NOW FOR SPRING SEEDING ALFALFA. Are you planning on seeding more alfalfa next spring? If you are, NOW is the time to prepare the seed bed. We wish to repeat again what we have said many times, that if the advice given below is carried out, you will be assured of a good producing field of alfalfa. In this advice we are merely giving the methods found successful by many different alfalfa growers in various parts of Du Page County. The following outline gives the methods to be followed: 1. Manure land with at least 8 tons per acre. 2. Fall plow. 3. Apply from 2 to 5 tons of ground limestone per acre on the surface of plowed land. 4. Work thoroughly in spring with disc and harrow. 5. Seed with nurse crop of barley or spring wheat. 6. Use 17 to 20 pounds of alfalfa seed and one bushel of barley or wheat per acre. 7. Inoculate seed with glue method. The dirt is taken from around sweet clover plants and is allowed to dry thoroughly in the shade; it is then pulverized and sifted until a fine dust. The seed is then moistened with a solution of one pound of common furfure glue dissolved in 2 to 2 1/2 gallons of water. The dust is then mixed with the wet alfalfa seed until there is a dust covering on each seed. When plenty of dust is used, the seed will be dry enough to seed immediately. 8. Seed with a seed attachment to a drill. 9. Roll the land thoroughly (preferably with a corrugated roller). 10. After harvesting the barley or wheat nurse crop, clip the field close to the ground.
