COCKRAN TO SPEAK AT THE COLISEUM

The Hon. W. Bourke Cockran, the famous New York attorney and orator, will deliver a lecture at the Coliseum, Chicago, Monday evening, Nov. 29. Mr. Cockran's subject will be "A Plea for Peace," and the address will be free to the public. The Knights of Columbus of Illinois, under whose auspices the famous orator is coming west, have made arrangements for the accommodation of 12,000 in the Coliseum. A speaker's platform with sounding board and other acoustic devices will assure to all in the mighty amphitheater a perfect hearing of the speaker.

In addition to the lecture there will be a band concert which in itself will be a treat. The purpose of the Knights of Columbus is to give the people of Chicago and environs, up to the capacity of the largest auditorium in the city, an opportunity to hear the famous man's argument and eloquence at no cost to themselves. These arrangements have been under the direction of State Deputy William N. Brown and Grand Knight George P. Mulligan, chairman of the Grand Knights' committee on arrangements. Of Mr. Cockran's power and ability as a public speaker and advocate the reading public has heard much in the last fifteen years. He has taken part in many of the national campaigns and has been heard as the champion of many a good cause. His present mission is no less important than those he has labored in in the past. The peace Mr. Cockran urges is a peace that every American, no matter what his nativity or the nativity of his forbears, wishes for most heartily--peace within the country, peace among neighbors, peace among the citizens of the city, state and nation--the peace of religious understanding and brotherhood.

Disposed of the Plans.

While preparations were being made for the attack on New Orleans, the navy department came into possession of a complete set of plans of the defenses of that city. Not only were the positions of the forts laid down, but also, the submarine mines, as well as the system of torpedoes, and the reserve of war vessels which were to cooperate with the land batteries. No time was lost in sending it to Admiral Farragut, but no acknowledgment ever reached the navy department. Meanwhile, the passage of the forts was effected. New Orleans captured, Admiral Farragut, in due time, went North. Proceeding to Washington, he at once called at the navy department, where he received hearty congratulations upon his brilliant successes. While he was in the department a prominent official referred to the plans of the defenses of New Orleans, and asked the admiral if he had ever received them. "Yes," he replied, "I received the plans, but on examination I found out that, according to them, New Orleans could never be taken; so I tore them up and threw them into the waste basket."
