## BUNNING'S QUINTET BEATS DUNCAN'S FIVE

Wins by 137 Pins in a Close Match—Mrkwicka Gets High Average.

In a close match game at the local alleys last Friday night the five captained by L. E. Bunning won by 137 pins from Cap. Duncan's squad.

So close were the five matched that at any stage of the three games almost it was anybody's match. The spectators were about evenly divided in their rooting, first pulling for the team, and then, suddenly, for the other.

Both teams fought hard for a leadership in the opener, but could gain no advantage, as the game was tied at 830 pins. George Vix had a chance to run his team a little ahead, as, apportioning for the Bunnings, he had three pins to pick up for a spare, nine pins tying, he hit the head pin a shade thin and the score was tied.

In the second Mrkwicka got away to a good start, he spared and then got six strikes in a row, after which he bumped into two hard luck railroads, ending with 231, high score for the evening. He also got away with the high average, 187 1/2. W. Staats and Gerwig, rolling along each other, tied with an average of 184 1/2 for the next high. C. Staats with a good many hard luck splits, due to rolling a small, egg shaped ball, had the evening's low average, 142.

The next match between local teams will be rolled on Monday, December 6, the team will be captained by Mrkwicka and Gerwig, high averages of Friday's match and will probably be as follows: "Blues"—Mrkwicka, Stump, Duncan, Balanski and C. Staats; "Reds"—Gerwig, W. Staats, G. Vix, Bunning and Bender.
