School Epidemics. Science now tells us that the most langerous time for the spreading of some of the infectious diseases is just before the child feels that he is ill tle sore throat and has a discharge from the nose. At this time the germs are most numerous and most active The modern method of bandling an epidemic places the burden of respon ability upon the school nurse or school physician. There is much less danger of spreading the disease with the chil dren under supervision in the school room than when they are running at will in the streets. By careful examination the school nurse can recog nize the approach of the disease much earlier than can the parents. During epidemica it is wise to keep children away from Sunday school and moving picture shows, but in general it is much safer to keep them in day school under the supervision of physicians or nurse inspectors.-From The Nurse
