Forest Nash left last Friday for Pasadena, Cal., his old stamping grounds, after a few months' visit with his folks and old friends here.

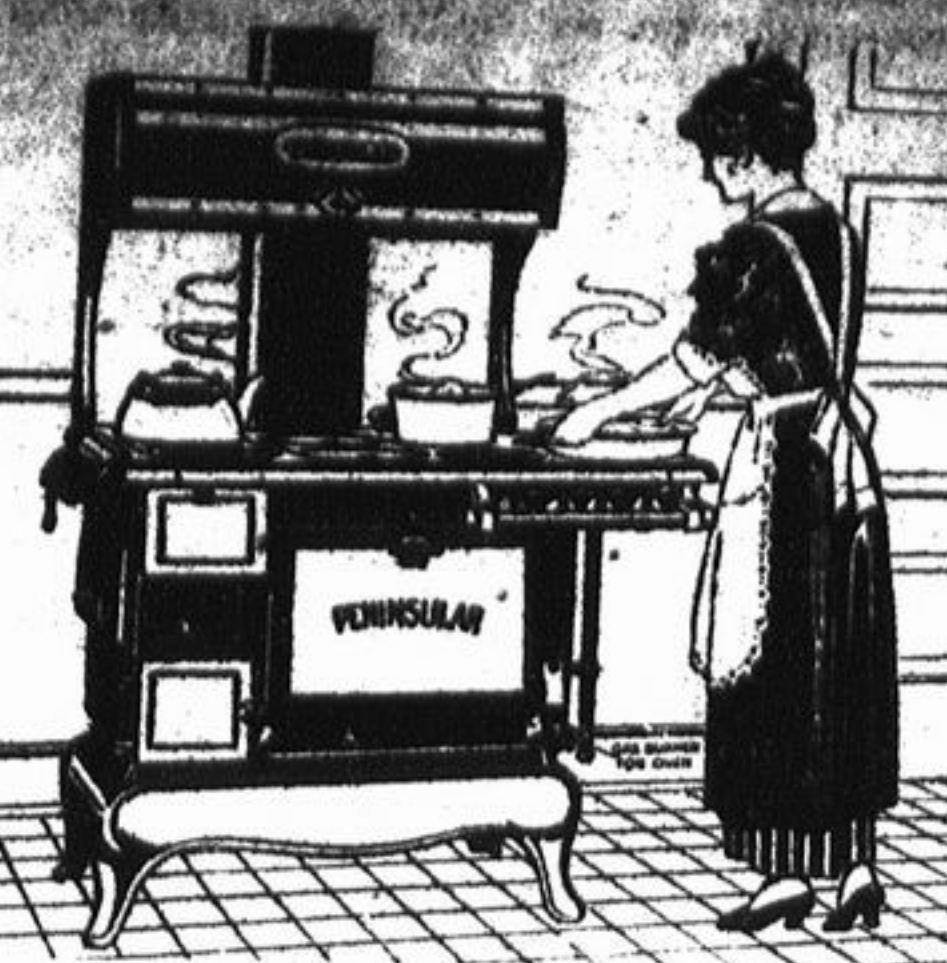
The new officers of the Hinsdale, LaGrange and Downers Grove lodges of the Knights of Pythias will be installed at Hinsdale tonight.

The Democratic Club of Downers Grove Will Pay Tribute to Memory of Great Emancipator.

The Democratic Club will celebrate Lincoln's birthday, February 12, with a Dutch Lunch—probably in Library Hall—to local Democrats and their friends. Speaking and music will be on the program and it is expected that the affair will be a good boost for the big Jefferson Day banquet which will be given about the middle of April.

To make a practical application of the first principle of the Club, namely, "To develop the spirit and growth of patriotism and the fundamental principles of Democracy," the Club makes the following offer to the pupils of the Downers Grove schools.

To any member of the High School, for the best original essay on "The Spirit of Lincoln," five dollars, and to any member of the seventh or eighth grades, for the best original "Sketch of Lincoln," two and a half dollars.

The articles will be judged by the truth and accuracy with which the writers gauge the present day influence of Lincoln in American political thought and life, his place as a statesman and the literary merit of the productions.

Papers submitted should contain not less than a thousand nor more than fifteen hundred words. Each paper must be marked with a number and not signed. A card bearing the name of each author and a duplicate of the number of his essay, and enclosed in a sealed envelope must accompany each article. All compositions must be mailed on or before January 29 to James R. Shaffer, president, Democratic Club of Downers Grove, Goewe street and Chicago avenue.

Mr. Shaffer has named Mrs. Minnie H. Prince, Mr. H. P. Jones and Rev. I. Milton Gray as a committee to judge the productions along the lines outlined above.

The names of the winners will be announced in the Reporter, February 9. They will be invited to attend the lunch as guests of honor, read their papers and accept the prizes.

FIRST "PURPLE" FIVE WINS FROM HARRISON TECH

Lightweights Lose - Wheaton Five Comes for Battle With Locals Tonight

Last Friday evening the local high school basketball teams split even with the Harrison Tech. fives. The Heavies of the Purple and White copped easily, while the lightweights were handed a defeat.

In the curtain raiser the Harrison boys scored first, but our fellows kept right after them, only to lose by hard-luck shots. The Harrison boys were heavier and used rough tactics for a while until the youngsters representing our school showed them how the country lads play, and Harrison was somewhat surprised. The game was exceptionally fast and interesting. The Harrison boys were somewhat good at losing baskets, while the Downers boys had excellent team work and did splendid guarding, but lacked the luck in basket tossing. At the close of the initial period the score stood 10 to 6, with Harrison claiming the higher end. In the last half Harrison was held closer and the game ended with the score 16 to 9 in Harrison's favor.

In the second tilt of the evening the Downers Grove High School Heavies had a soft victory, absolutely crushing the Harrison Heavies, who came with an excellent reputation. The opening of the game was similar to light-weight game, for play had not been in order very long when the hard tactics of Harrison were again shown, but our boys passed over that very quickly by pouring in a string of baskets and carrying the ball down the floor in a lightning fashion. The Harrison boys were utterly outplayed in every way and before many minutes elapsed the Chicago basket tossers were in want of wind. At half time the locals were leading 15 to 4. The last half was the locals' because of their superior passing and excellent work of the guards. The game ended with the score standing 29 to 7, the locals now victorious for the fourth time in succession. Butler again made the most baskets, making 18 of the 29 points. Jorgenson, as usual, displayed his excellent ability and can easily be classed as the mainstay of the local. Captain Griffith and DeWitt also shared in the scoring, caging two apiece. Davenport has a clean slate, but that does not say he played a good game, for Davenport is an excellent floorman.
