What History Really Is.
 All history resolves itself very easily into the biography of a few brave and earnest persons.

CAPTAIN T. S. ROGERS.

Commodore of the First Regt. people of the district.
 His second school was at Lake and during the winter of 1861, '62, '63 and '64 he taught in Downers Grove.
 On December 13, 1865, he was united in marriage to Helen Stanley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dexter Stanley. Two children were born of this union, both dying in infancy. Mrs. Rogers passed away Feb. 5, 1906, and on May 11, 1908, he married Mrs. Calla E. Bush.
 In the fall of 1861 Captain Rogers bought a thrashing machine which he ran for eight years. In 1865 he bought a farm a mile and a half east of the village which he worked during the summer, continuing to teach school during the winter. Three years later he was an active participant in the first Republican campaign, supporting Fremont and Dayton. He was one of the organizers and captain of the Plow Boys, a political organization which visited all the neighboring towns in the Republican campaign of 1856 and 1860.
 He was elected sheriff of Du Page county in 1860 and moved to Naperville, serving actively in his civic office until he was mustered into the United States service as captain in the 16th Regiment Illinois Volunteer Infantry.

He received a captain's commission from Richard Yates, war governor of Illinois, July 9, 1862, and assisted in raising four companies in Du Page county and six in DeKalb county which formed the 16th regiment. Captain Rogers was mustered into the United States service Sept. 2, 1862, with his regiment at Dixon, Ill., for three years' service. Until after the Atlanta campaign Captain Rogers served with his company in the field, being present in the battles of Chattanooga in 1863 and at Nashville in 1864 and the march from Resaca to Atlanta.
 After the fall of Atlanta Captain Rogers resigned his command and returned home to resume his duties as sheriff of the county. He was never seriously wounded but had several narrow escapes from death.
 He resigned as sheriff in July, 1866, going to Chicago to engage in his first and provision business. His first store was opened on the present site of the Tribune building at Madison and Dearborn streets, where he remained until 1868, when he built at State and Adams streets.

His market was consumed in the great fire of 1871 and he erected another building in Midway court, where he was again burned out in 1874. He then located in 20th street and then at 16th street and Wabash avenue, later moving to 18th street and Wabash avenue.
 He sold his business and retired July 1, 1894, after thirty-eight years to a day of Chicago business life.
 Captain Rogers was the first president of the village board of Downers Grove, which office he filled for thirteen years. He also served on the state board of equalization for eleven years.

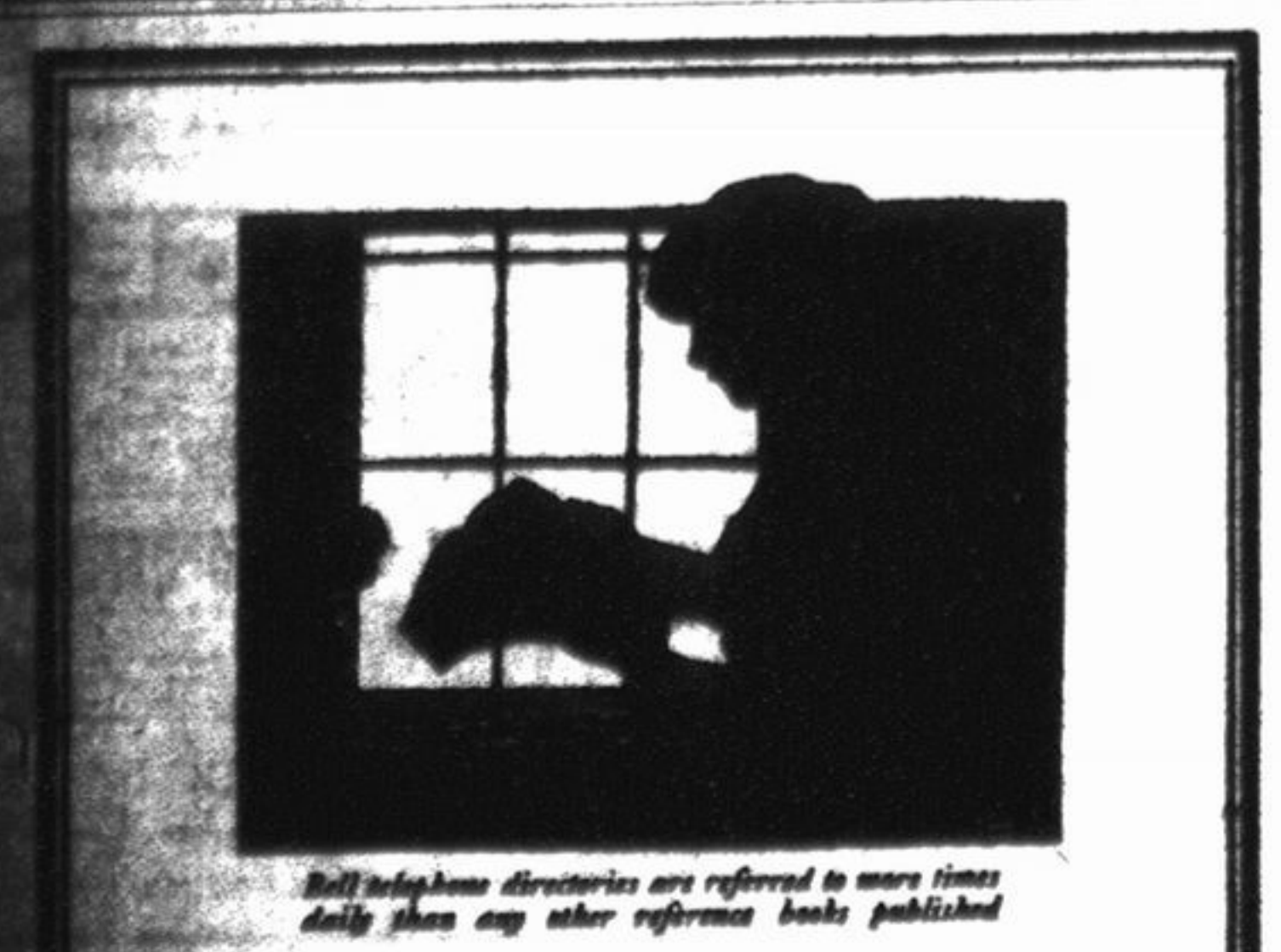
