Meteor Trail Spiral,

A persistent meteor trail reported by W. H. Stevenson to the British Astronomical association, had a curious spiral shape. Immediately after the passage of the brilliant meteor, the trail was traced with the finder of the observer's telescope, and was found to consist of regular undulations, about a degree from crest to crest, and with an amplitude of a fourth of a degree. Regular variations in brightness made it evident that the trail had the form of a helix. In the three minutes the trail was watched, there was no perceptible drift or change of shape, making it quite evident that the form was not due to air currents, and it is suggested that the meteor may have had a helical mo-


