## BURIED HERE WITH MILITARY HONORS

Ludwig John Carlson, first gunner's mate in the United States Navy answered the last bugle call four days ago at LosAnimas, Colorado, and was buried with military honors Wednesday, June 14, in the West Side cemetery here.

For fifteen years he had served in the American Navy and in recognition of his devotion to the flag his body was escorted to its last resting place by a detail of twenty five blue-jackets from the Great Lakes Naval Training station. The sailor boys were under command of Boatswain A. Lundine and the services at the grave were directed by Chaplain Frank Thompson, who is senior chaplain in the service. At the close of the impressive ritual for the dead a salute was fired and the last earthly taps were sounded over the grave.

The decedent was an adopted son of Olaf Carlson, of Fairmount Avenue, Downers Grove. He was thirty one years old at the time of his death. Early in life he evinced a love for the sea and at the first opportunity enlisted to serve Uncle Sam.
