Taken to Wheaton and Asylum and Left hand solo Relatives Notified of Detention.

Chas. Bradley, a young man who gave his age at twenty-one, was picked up by Chief White at Shade Chilvers farm, southwest of town, Monday evening. He had been at the farm for a few hours and his talk and actions made Mrs. Chilvers suspicious so she called Chief White.

Upon being questioned the young man said he had escaped from a hospital for the insane at Cleveland, Ohio, the week before.

Immediate Response Necessary. Applications for the second training camp will be received between June 15th and July 15th at the local offi cers' recruiting headquarters. Under no circumstanceswill an applicant be considered after July 15th. Upon the termination of this period, army examiners will visit various point, to be announced in each state. An applicant selected for personal and physical examination will be notified to anpear before the regular army officer in person, at a convenient point, for inquiry into his record, capacity, leadership, and qualifications in general.

The obligation involved is "enlistment for a period of three months" only. Applicants will agree to accept. at the end of the training, such commission in the Army of the United around his body, starts to slide over States as may be tendered by the Sec. the edge of the roof to his accidenretary of War. 
