GOV. LOWDEN AND THE 4th OF JULY

Governor Frank O. Lowden has joined the State Council of Defense to arouse the patriotic fervor of Illinois for observance of the Fourth of July with the enthusiasm and patriotism the times demand. In a statement made especially in behalf of the Council's effort, Governor Lowden says:
"Almost a century and a half ago, our fathers declared their independence. The principles which they then announced have been our inspiration in every crisis of our national life. Under those principles, humanity now is waging a world-wide war against autocracy, everywhere. The issues in this war are the issues for which our fathers fought and died. But the territory to which it was sought to apply these principles was restricted to a narrow strip of land along the Atlantic Coast. The war raging now will decide that those principles shall apply to all mankind, or that they shall perish from the earth. We opened this war at Lexington; that battle is not finished. The Revolutionary Fathers failed, if we do not now complete their work."
