SPRAY FOR CABBAGE PEST

I have been making a speciality of onions and cabbages but have been much troubled with green worms. I have tried different formulas but have now found one that I have never seen in print. It is doing me more service than any I have tried. Here it is: Take a half pint of crude or raw petroleum oil and add a half teaspoon of potash. Shake these well together. To this add 10 gallons of water and a little paris green or arsenate of lead. It will kill the worms and will stick to the leaves until the cabbage grows. I apply this preparation with a compressed air sprayer, throwing it well into the loose heads and over the tender leaves. The preparation mixes smoothly and evenly and will not injure the foliage in any way. It must be thoroughly mixed to be effective. (A. C. Gerson)

EVERY FUR SEAL HAS HAREM

Male Sometimes Gathers More Than 100 Females on the Section of Beach Which He Controls. For seals are extremely polygamous and the old males, which weigh from 400 to 500 pounds, "haul up" first on the breeding benches. Each bull holds a certain area, and as the females, only one-fifth his size, come ashore they are appropriated by the nearest bulls until each "beach master" gathers a harem, sometimes containing more than 100 members, says the National Geographic Magazine. Here the young are born, and after the mating season, the seals which have remained ashore without food from 4 to 6 weeks, return to the water. The mothers go and come, and each is able to find her young with certainty among thousands of apparently identical woolly black "pups." From the ages of one to four years for seals are extremely playful. They are marvelous swimmers and frolic about in pursuit of one another now diving deep and then, one after the other, suddenly leaping high above the surface in graceful curves, like porpoises. Squids and fish of various species are their main food. Their chief natural enemy is the killer whale, which follows their migrations and haunts the sea about their breeding ground, taking heavy toll among them.
