AUTO OWNERS SHOULD STUDY NEW RULINGS

Last Legislature Passed Several New Auto Laws—Children Under 16 Cannot Drive

EFFECTIVE THE FIRST OF JULY

Owners of automobiles and drivers should inform themselves about several new State laws that went into effect Sunday, July 1st.

Glaring Headlights

Headlights must be dimmed or extinguished within two hundred yards of an approaching vehicle, everywhere in the State, on the country roads as well as on city or village streets.

This law will make it necessary for the owners of cars with gas lamps to equip their car with some effective dimmers for the lights or to have the car equipped with electric lights that may be dimmed.

The "Kid" Driver

It is now against the law for any person under sixteen years of age to drive a car, the fine being from \$10 to \$25 for any person who permits the child to drive.

Garage Men Have Lien

Garage owners are given the right of lien on automobiles, permitting their seizure for unpaid bills.

Car Thieves

Any person who in any way tampers with a car standing at the curb is subject to a fine of \$200.

The new law sets a fine of \$200, six months in jail, or both, for having in one's possession a car in which the manufacturer's number has been removed or defaced.

Licenses Fees

The rates for state automobile licenses are to be boosted fifty per cent next year and another fifty per cent increase will be made January 1, 1920.
