The following short letter from Norman Andersen does not give much actual information outside the fact that he is well. We imagine that not much is written for fear that it would be censored.

Base Hospital No. 12, France, Wednesday 6-13-17.
"Have arrived safely at destination after many scares of danger. Before coming to France we spent a week at Blackpool, England, then went thro London to Folkestone, the city that was raided by the german (small "g" is the way to spell german now). The destruction which I saw at Folkestone was too bad to relate.

From Folkestone, we crossed the channel, which happened to be calm, to a city in France. From there we marched to a camp where we stayed overnight. Tuesday, June 12th we entered for our hospital.

The conditions in Europe are bad. Women run street cars, wagons, motors, stores and shops. They are in factories, hauling coal and other materials. Along the railroads the children yell and clamor for food and money.
