The following resolution to establish a new election district in Lisle Township was on motion of Supervisor Kohley approved:  
To the Board of Supervisors of DuPage County, Illinois.  
Gentlemen:  
Whereas at the last General Election held in November, 1916, it was found that there were approximately six hundred and fifty voters who cast their ballots in Precinct No. 3 in Lisle Township, the polling place of which is at the Burlington Hotel, at the corner of Center Street and the C. B. & Q. tracks, in the City of Naperville.  
The facilities at this polling place have proven themselves inadequate for the accommodation of so many voters, and many complaints have been made to the Supervisor of Lisle Township, by voters, because of the congestion and delay in this polling place.  
In view of this congested condition in the aforesaid precinct, the undersigned Supervisor of Lisle Township requests that the Board of Supervisors of the County of DuPage establish a new election precinct, as provided by an act of the General Assembly entitled

"An Act in regard to elections, and to provide for filling vacancies in elective officers"  
Approved April 3, 1872. In force July 1, 1872.  
by dividing the territory of the Third Precinct of Lisle Township into two precincts and establish a polling place for the new Precinct, said new precinct to be known as Precinct No. 4, said polling place to be in Hose House No. 4 at 245 Front Street. The territory of Precinct No. 4 shall be taken from the present Precinct No. 3 and describing it by metes and bounds, will be as follows:  
That part of Lisle Township bounded on the West by the West line of Lisle Township, on the North by the North line of Lisle Township, on the East by the East line of Sections 8 and 5,

and on the South by the C. B. & Q. R. R.  
The remainder of the present Precinct No. 3 to remain as such. The Judges of the 4th District are Frank Shimp, Eugene Cassel and Frank Hawbecker.
