Dear Friends:

Just a few lines to say that I have been moved from the Brooklyn Navy Yard to the historical region of Boston. The Harvard University has turned over its grounds and buildings to the Navy Dept.

Our company has been assigned Perkins Hall, one of the newest and best dormatories of the University. It is a four story brick building

We dine in Old Memorial Hall, place where the names of all of the Harvard students are. That is, those who died fighting for the colors.


