The Red Cross membership drive is under the supervision of Mrs. J. P. MacDonald, president of the local Red Cross unit. Acting with her is a membership committee of which J. F. Kidwell is general chairman. The young lady volunteers are under the direction of the following in the four wards: 1st ward, Miss Emma Fletcher; 2nd ward, Mrs. C. F. Davis; 3rd ward, Mrs. John Remmers; 4th ward, Mrs. Horace Dutton.

The membership drive began at the Community picnic last Wednesday at Plainfield with gratifying results and will be continued until Saturday, Aug. 25.

Yearly membership in the Red Cross costs one dollar. Sustaining memberships two dollars. There is no limit to the number of memberships which each individual may purchase and every dollar goes into the active service of the Red Cross.

Hundreds of women in Downers Grove are working, knitting, sewing and preparing comforts for our boys; thousands all over the country are helping likewise so let your response to the call for funds be instant and hearty.

Because of the Business Men's picnic the Red Cross work day was Tuesday, instead of Wednesday, this week. Hereafter Tuesday will be the regular day for the sessions at the Library. The women are now taking up civilian relief work for the widows and orphans of those portions of Europe that have been devastated by war. Old clothes are being used for this purpose.

All products that Downers Grove women are knitting must be turned in by Sept. 1st if they are to go to Downers Grove boys. Thus far the Downers Grove workers have looked after the recruits from this village chiefly. After Sept. 1st everything will have to go through the regular channels, in line with the new efficiency program of the American Red Cross, so that those who wish their work to go to Downers Grove soldiers and sailors will have to hasten it to completion.
