Coal operators are seeking to give the people of Illinois the impression that Governor Lowden's action in trying to settle the coal question has "complicated the situation." And so it did—for them. They were anxious to be left alone. They wanted to continue extracting large profits during a trying time. But it should not be forgotten that it was the promptness of Governor Lowden that precipitated the discussion of coal prices and hastened action by the federal government.

The situation was extremely simple until Governor Lowden acted. The chairman of the Coal Production committee of the National Council of Defense was Mr. Francis S. Peabody, by all odds the largest coal operator in Illinois. It was, therefore, easy for Mr. Peabody to agree upon the price of coal in Illinois with the operators of Illinois. One who suggested that the prices so reached did not take into consideration the interests of the public naturally would complicate the situation.

If, however, anyone has "complicated the situation" it is the coal operators themselves who repudiated their agreement and with cuttle-fish methods sought to cloud the waters for the purpose of deceiving the consumers.
