"THE DUMMY"

Jack Pickford Makes Good in Juvenile "Detective" Story, an Adaptation from the Stage.

Eve Unsell has written a script for "The Dummy" that is worth while. For a basis she used the stage story of Harvey J. O'Higgins and Harriet Ford. She has given us a tale that in its telling carries bits of comedy as well as moments of drama and melodrama. Francis Grandon is the director. The story is staged around and in New York City. For a background there is a kidnapping of the

child of an incompatible pair, a former messenger boy employed in the city, and the presence of a sort of kidnappers and detectives.

Jack Pickford has the role of Barney, the discharged messenger boy much fed up on nickel detective literature. He takes speedily to his new employment of aid to the great detective Babblings, skillfully portrayed by Frank Losee. Young Barney has adventures aplenty. "POPPY"

Poppy Destin, a friendless orphan of fourteen runs away from the home of her aunt, when she is treated with the utmost cruelty. Wandering in the desert she was near death from hunger and exposure when she was found by a man on horseback, Evelyn Carson. He took her to the home of a friend, Lance Abinger, where she was cared for. Abinger usually lived in Durban, but had retired to his farm on account of an affair with a woman known as Carmen Braganza. She had slashed his cheek open when she discovered that he had been intimate with another woman. Abinger realizes that Poppy will become a beautiful woman, and engages a tutor for her and gives her all the advantages his wealth can provide. Later he takes advantage of the visit of a French priest to his farm, to marry Poppy. The ceremony is conducted in French, and Abinger tells Poppy it is merely a formal adoption as his ward.

After a few years of travel in Europe, Abinger brings Poppy to his Durban home, a big mansion set back in a large park-like garden, surrounded by a high iron fence, the gate of which Abinger keeps locked. He flies into a rage when she demands that she be introduced to his friends, and he leaves the city, with a final warning to his servants not to let Poppy leave the grounds. In his hurried departure, Abinger forgets to lock the gate, though Poppy does not know this. One evening when she is strolling through the grounds a man wanders in. It is Carson, who has become a rich man, and is half delirious. He meets Poppy and they fall desperately in love. He leaves her and is ill for many weeks, and when he recovers thinks the incident was only a dream.

Abinger returns and tells Poppy that he has learned of the love affair but does not know that the man is his friend Carson. Poppy decides to leave him and make her own way in the world, as she has a real talent for writing. She goes to London, where a child is born, but soon dies. Poppy becomes famous and returns to Durban.

Abinger tells Poppy that unless she returns to him as his wife willingly he will make their marriage public. Poppy meets Carson and he recognizes her as the girl he thought was only a dream. Mrs. Portal, who is infatuated with Carson, sees them together, and tells Abinger, whom she overheard calling Poppy his wife. Abinger tells Carson that Poppy has deceived them all, and that the man she really loves is the one who visited her in the garden of his home. Carson says he is the man. Abinger then renounces his claim on Poppy and says he will have their marriage annulled. Mrs. Portal threatens to denounce Poppy herself, and tell of her marriage to Abinger, but Abinger says if she does, he will make public the fact that it was on account of her that Carmen Braganza had wounded him in the face. Thus Poppy and Carson are left free to marry.

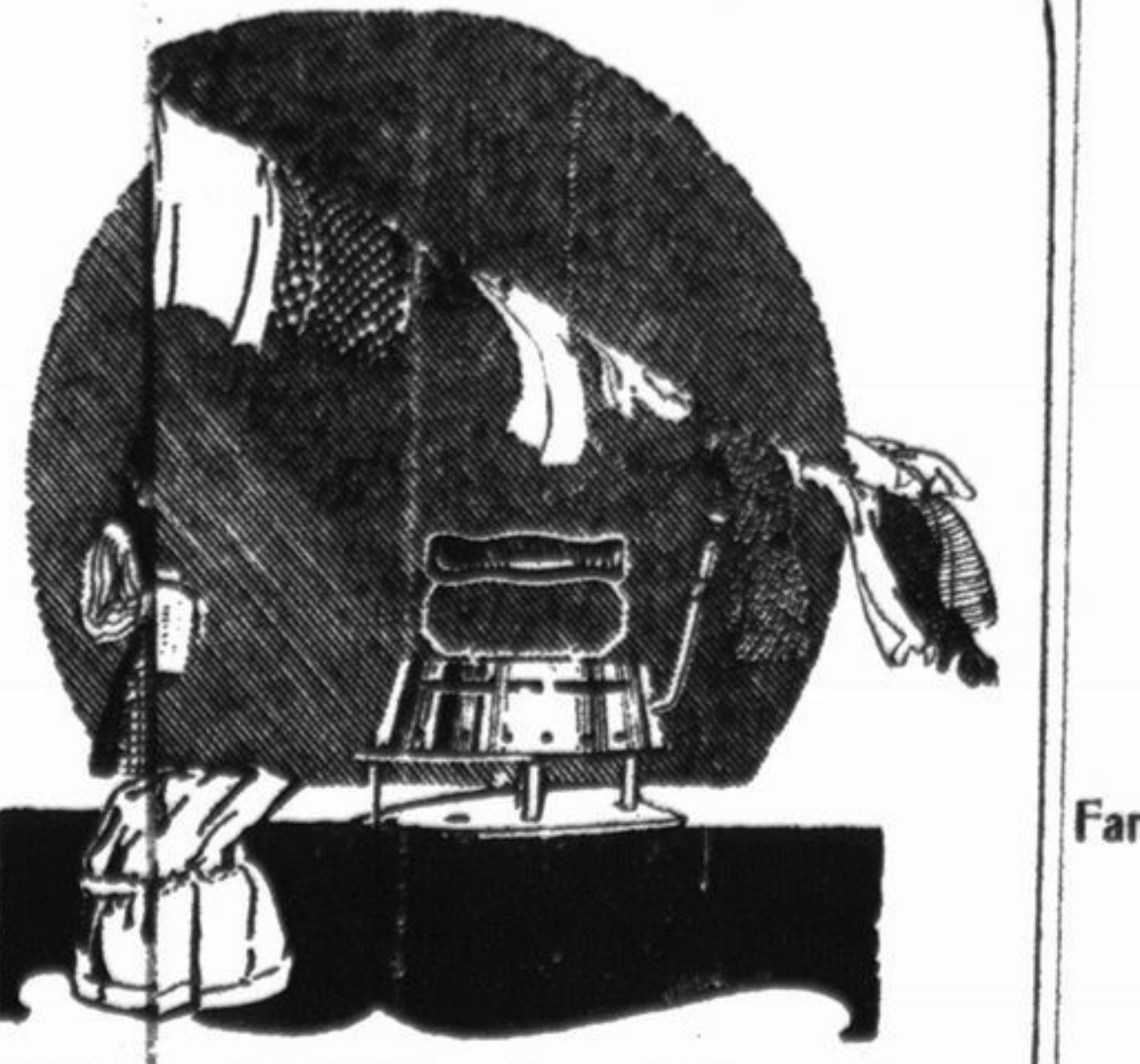
