**LIGHTNING KILLS COWS WEDNESDAY**

During the severe thunder storm Wednesday night lightning struck the large barn on the H. F. This is the third time in ten years that stock has been killed by lightning on this farm. Mr. Sucher lost a horse about five years ago and a cow ten years ago.

During the same storm a cow on the Robt. Eichhorst farm about three miles south was also killed by a bolt of lightning while in the pasture.

**"PLOW BOYS" BANNER DISCOVERED**

Flag Made by Local Women in 1889 for Political Organization On Exhibition.

In cleaning out a lot of rubbish and relics from the attic of the Capt. Rogers home recently, the old "Plow Boys" banner was found. This banner is now on exhibition in the window of Swearingen's store and is worth an examination.

The Plow Boys were a political organization very much interested in the nomination and election of Abraham Lincoln to the presidential chair. They were recruited from and around Downers Grove and attended political rallies all over the northern part of the state. They were present at the nomination of Lincoln by the Republican party in Chicago making the trip on a specially constructed wagon drawn by eight matched horses and holding forty-five men.

The banner shown was made by local women and presented to the Plow Boys on September 22, 1860 and was carried by them until the organization was disbanded by the Civil war, most of the members enlisting in the army. They were famous all over the northern part of the state in these stirring times and their attendance at rallies greatly desired by political leaders.
