## Single Register Furnace

This furnace is arranged to heat from a single register any ordinary house of 5 or 6 rooms.

The heated air is conducted from the furnace through the large center pipe and discharged from the central portion of the register face.

The cold air which is the motive power that forces the warm air out of the furnace into the rooms is drawn from the rooms and is replaced by the warm air. Therefore the temperature is equalized in all the rooms in which the doors are left open.
